# Thousands of acres had been 'broken out'

Sherman County Historical Society July 28, 1905: A Year for Sod Breaking — The last four or five years have been good years in Sherman County, but this year has been the best.

Thousands of acres of prairie sod have been plowed for the first time, "broken out," this year, and the acreage sown next year will be the largest in county's history.

Ten years ago, the total wheat crop of Sherman County was 4,500 bushels. This year, one need not get off the train to see a half dozen farms, any one of which will yield as much.

The farmers in this county say they see the unmistakable signs of climatic changes going on. The nights are not as cold, moisture is more regular and the weather conditions more uniform.
