# 4-Hers learn skills, have projects judged

The Goodland Star-News Where can you learn to train a dog, show a pig, cook, make arts and crafts and work with wood? 4-H provides all that and opportunities to go camping, fishing and skiing, to perform on stage and to have your work judged.

Paige Phillips, 10, and her cousin Shyanne Austin, 9, have kept busy in 4-H while school is out and have learned skills they can use for life. They have been on ski trips with their club, Beaver Valley, gone to fishing clinics and participated in the bike rodeo.

Competing in 4-H Days and performing at Talent Night is an annual highlight.

Phillips has been in 4-H for four years and is the club's reporter. This year, she is doing projects for arts and crafts, wood working and food and has two dogs and a pig, Lilly. Austin is in her first year and is doing arts and crafts and has a pig, Peanut.

In her years in 4-H, Phillips has learned to cook, has made a cutting board her mother Lori Phillips uses all the time, has made a stepping stone to adorn their yard and trained her dogs, Jessie, a schnauzer, and Buddy, a Shih Tzu.

She earned a state fair blue ribbon at the Northwest Kansas District Free Fair for a candy jar made from painted clay pots when she was seven but didn't get to go to the state fair because only those age 10 and over can go.

Besides gaining skills and making memories, Phillips has a picture frame decorated with cut glass, a beaded keychain, a painted vase, a bird house and cooking skills to show for her years in 4-H. She has raised money selling a pig to help pay for 4-H camp in Rock Springs, did a project talk on her candy jar at 4-H Days and played piano at Talent Night.

She's adding large red mushrooms for the garden and either a duck made out of tennis balls or a dog made from clay pots when she completes this year's crafts.

Austin is working on a stepping stone and a calendar for arts and crafts. Pictures on the calendar include decals and cut-outs, drawings and her name in cursive with its mir-

She is only doing arts and crafts and swine projects. Lori Phillips said she only wanted Shyanne to do two projects her first year. Paige had too many one year, Lori said.

Paige said she learned to cook from 4-H, taking cooking classes on Wednesdays; this is her second year. She has made meals in class, including pizza and meat loaf, homemade ice cream, bread and pretzels from scratch, cookies and churned butter.

The dogs are Phillips' favorite project, one she has worked with three years; this year, she is having Jessie perform in agility and Buddy in showmanship and obedience.

Both girls seem to enjoy their pigs but have discovered things change from year to year. This year, Lori Phillips said, they treat the pigs to marshmallows and Oreos because they aren't gaining weight like they should because it's too hot. Last year, she said, there was a diet pen and an OK pen.

They keep the pigs at Rod and Kim Roeder's house near the airport, a location that works well because the

girls go there for daycare.

Paige's sister Chelsea, 5, likes to help feed and take care of the pigs and attends 4-H meetings even though she isn't a member yet.

The family helped sell fruit to raise money for the club's ski trip and went skiing near Boulder. Everyone chips in and brings goodies to munch on, Lori said.

The adults sat in the lodge eating junk food and watching movies, the girls said, though Lori insisted that wasn't all they did. Chelsea wasn't sure she liked skiing, Lori said, but she liked the escalator (ski lift).

When Paige went to the four-day camp at the Rock Springs 4-H Center in the Flint Hills, she got to do arts and crafts and wood working and go canoeing, hiking, swimming and horseback riding.

The family participated in the club tour and pot luck Sunday, July 17, and their club is decorating a hay bale for the 4-H centennial. The club whose bale wins will decorate one at the state fair, Lori said.

Lori works for her father; she is a nurse at Dr. Kenneth Austin's clinic.

A Life member of Scouts, Taolor is already planning for his Eagle Scout project. He wants to see more benches at Chambers Park, and wants to help get the fountain running again. He plans to go out for football this fall. He has tried football, basketball, golf, wrestling and track at Grant Junior High. He is involved in the youth group at Sonrise Christian Church.

The brothers work together at the secluded spot west of town where the pigs are, and they make sure there is enough water and food for the pigs. The pigs are sprayed to reduce the insect problems, and they have a good
