Goodland fans can watch or listen to the 32nd Kansas Shrine Bowl Saturday, featuring a Goodland football player and two Goodland band members at the Kansas State University Stadium in Manhattan.

Goodland's Brock Lohr will be playing for the West all-star team, and Matt Rohr and Brianna Taylor from Goodland will play in the Shrine Bowl Band.

KKCI Radio in Goodland (FM102.5) will broadcast the game beginning with pre-game comments at 5:45 p.m.

The kick-off scheduled for 6 p.m. Mountain Time.

Smoky Hills Public Television (KOOD Channel 2) will broadcast the game, with television pre-game events starting at 5:30 p.m. Mountain Time.

Sixty-eight of the best high school football players from throughout the state, including all the Kansas Football Coaches Association's "Top 11," will compete.

Selection, made by a media panel of about 40 members, includes players from each of the state's six high school classifications, plus eight-man football.
