

Shrine Bowl features Goodland player

Goodland fans can watch or listen to the 32nd Kansas Shrine Bowl Saturday, featuring a Goodland football player and two Goodland band members at the Kansas State University Stadium in Manhattan.

Goodland's Brock Lohr will be playing for the West all-star team, and Matt Rohr and Brianna Taylor from Goodland will play in the Shrine Bowl Band.

KKCI Radio in Goodland (FM102.5) will broadcast the game beginning with pre-game comments at 5:45 p.m.

The kick-off scheduled for 6 p.m. Mountain Time.

Smoky Hills Public Television (KOD Channel 2) will broadcast the game, with television pre-game events starting at 5:30 p.m. Mountain Time.

Sixty-eight of the best high school football players from throughout the state, including all the Kansas Football Coaches Association's "Top 11," will compete.

Each squad, one representing the East and the other the West, will have 34 players.

Selection, made by a media panel of about 40 members, includes players from each of the state's six high school classifications, plus eight-man football.

The athletes and coaches participating in the East-West Shrine All-Star Football game took a break from their nine days of intensive training last week to visit the kids in the St. Louis Shriners Hospital for Children.

The trip gave Lohr, his fellow athletes and coaches a first-hand experience with kids who benefit from

University of Colorado not shoo-in experts think

Plenty of experts out in the sports media are predicting that the Buffaloes of the University of Colorado will win the Big 12 Conference's North Division this coming season.

Both *Street & Smith's College Football* and *Phil Steele's College Football Preview* list Colorado as the favorite. The Big 12's media preseason poll, released July 18, has the Buffaloes ranked No. 1 in the North as well.

Three weeks ago, I said Colorado had the toughest non-conference schedule in the Big 12. The Buffaloes start with their traditional opener against Colorado State University, then a week later play host to the Aggies of New Mexico State, who went 5-6 last season.

After a week's break, Colorado heads to the Orange Bowl to face the University of Miami. If the Buffaloes go into conference play with a 3-0 record, they will be the team to beat in the North. If they don't they'll have to watch out for the University of Nebraska and Iowa State.

Colorado beat them both last sea-

son, the Cornhuskers by six points and the Cyclones by five. It was the Buffaloes' win over Iowa State that got them into the Big 12 championship, since both teams ended up 4-4 in conference play.

Both magazines pick Nebraska second in the North Division and Iowa State third. The 50 media experts who voted in the preseason poll reversed that, picking the Cyclones for No. 2 and the Huskers No. 3.

Colorado has 50 returning lettermen, including 17 starters. Nebraska is returning about 40 and Iowa State 31, so Colorado has the edge, but not a big one, in that department.

Let's narrow the field. I don't believe this is Iowa State's year, so it

comes down to Colorado or Nebraska.

So what's going to be the deciding factor? I say "intangibles"

Coach Gary Barnett is entering his seventh season at Colorado, and that's plenty to time to make the program his. Coach Bill Callahan enters his second season at Nebraska and hopefully is over the "feeling out" process.

Callahan has the advantage. He's seen his team in action and now has the chance to make the major adjustments needed for them to reflect his philosophy. Barnett's already had his chance, and although there'll be some tweaking, I don't

expect any major changes.

Nebraska's new attitude will edge out Colorado's established regimen.

I made a comparison of both magazines' projected starting line-ups and, going against the experts, believe Nebraska also has the edge in talent and potential.

The Cornhuskers have fresh

blood coming in where they need it and more experience in positions where it really counts.

Nebraska wins the North Division with Colorado probably second, depending on how tough Iowa State proves to be. Missouri needs more work and will finish fourth. Kansas State, which took a step back, and Kansas, which took a step

forward, will battle to stay out of the cellar.

Of course, in the end, it doesn't really matter whether Colorado, Iowa State or Nebraska represents the North Division in the conference championship. Whoever wins will get pounded by Texas or Oklahoma anyway, and North Division fans will get to grumble for another year.
