Shop lifting escalates into federal drug case

Free Press Editor What started out as a theft at Colby's Wal-Mart store in March involving two northwest Kansas people has escalated into a federal drug case involving a Colby man Am. and a Goodland woman.

Jason Neal Hopkins, 31, Colby, and TreshaA. Carter, 27, Goodland, were indicted on seven counts is U.S. District Court in Wichita on Thursday, July 28, said Detective Sgt. Gary Shull of the Colby Police Department..

Hopkins, also known as Jason I-70. Davis, was charged with unlawful possession of firearms (a machine gun and a firearm with a silencer) in furtherance of a drug crime; manufacturing of methamphetamine; possession of prohibited equipment used to manufacture methamphetamine; receiving, possessing and disposing of a stolen firearm; possession of a machine gun; possession of psuedoephedrine with intent to manufacture methamphetamine; and aiding and abetting.

Carter was indicted for unlawful possession of firearms; possession of a machine gun; possession of pseudoephredrine with intent to manufacture methamphetamine; manufacturing; and aiding and abetting.

One of the employees followed the vehicle as it fled and used his cell phone to keep in touch with the dispatcher.

Shull said the driver fled to the Oasis Travel Center area, turned back and headed east onto I-70, crossed over and then went west on

City and county officers chased the Colby interchange.

"The car ran a police roadblock that was set up at the bottom of the Thomas County jail in March, exit ramp and headed north on Range Avenue," Shull said. "The car fled at a high rate of speed on Range Avenue, including the records showed his real name was speeds in the residential areas south of Webster Avenue."

Police lost sight of the car as they slowed down in the residential area, near the Colby grade school. Hopkins abandoned the car in an alley near Webster and Chickamauga, but within seconds, he ran in front of one of the patrol cars. He was on Thursday, July 28, and Carter captured in a fenced back yard, and after a struggle, he was placed in a Drug Task force at her home in patrol car.

'A search warrant was obtained which appeared to contain a meth lab," Shull said. "There were 68 boxes of various types of pills as well as other items used in the manufacture of meth."

The car was registered to Angela Cook and Jerome (J.D.) Kruse of Oakley, but no charges have be filed against Cook and Kruse.

It was during the search that police found an fully automatic M1 carbine, along with another firearm and a suppresser (silencer) that also appeared to be fully automatic.

"Due to the seriousness of the the Pontiac, which got back off at crimes, the Drug Enforcement Agency was contacted," Shull said.

When he was booked into the Hopkins told officers that his name was Jason Davis.


