

# Boys stole \$630 from uncle, charged with robbery

**August 12, 1905:** Louis Frydendall, a man of about 50 years of age, who was packing around a roll of bills aggregating \$630, was robbed of that amount of money in the Camillo Jupe house by his two nephews, Andrew and George Frydendall.

The greater part of the money is now in the hands of Sheriff Bradley, and the two wayward boys are in the county jail awaiting trial upon the charge of robbery.

It is reported that the boys, together with their uncle, had been drinking that night, and after retiring to bed in a room in the Jupe rooming house, the old gentleman dozed into a sleep.

The next and most costly experience of the evening was when he was awakened by a movement of his pillow, and his pantaloons, in which this pocket book was kept, were being drawn from under the pillow

where he had placed them when he retired.

It has not yet developed which one of the boys did the "touching" act, but both of them went downstairs together with the old man in pursuit after the stolen money. In the scramble, the only thing he got was one of the boys' caps.

It appears that the theft was planned so as to catch train No. 5 as it pulled into Goodland for the west. At any rate, it just then arrived, and Andrew and George Frydendall boarded the blind baggage bound for parts unknown.

The uncle hastened immediately after the robbery, which occurred at about midnight, over to his relative, Nick Scallion, with the news. They went to the home of County Attorney Calvert and laid the matter before him, who in turn sent for Sheriff Bradley to the depot to send out

telegraphs in search of the young culprits.

J.T. Joyce was conductor on train No. 5. The boys were discovered to be stealing a ride in Burlington, and they were made to pay their fare to Limon. Meanwhile a telegram was waiting for Joyce at Seibert asking if the boys were on his train, and if they were, to wire ahead to the officers at Limon to arrest them. Thus Nemesis overtook the young robbers.

Joyce answered that the men in question were on his train, and he also dispatched the necessary word ahead so that when the train reached Limon the arrest was made. Sheriff Bradley went out to get the prisoners and returned with them on No. 42.

Louis Frydendall formerly owned land in Sherman County, but he sold it and invested in a mining

property in Cripple Creek, which he afterward sold and received several thousand dollars as his part.

George and Andrew are the sons of Andrew Frydendall, Sr., who is a respected farmer living south of town. George has been living in Chicago, and Andrew's associations, which were a good way from the best, may have been responsible for the inexcusable method of getting money. The boys will have time now to think over the saying of old, "The way of the transgressor is hard."

**August 13, 1905:** AD — Maitland and Lennox Coal for Threshing Purposes, \$6.00 per ton, at Foster Lumber Co's Yard.

**August 14, 1905:** The board of county commissioners of Sherman County were in conference with the commissioners of Kit Carson County, Colo., at Kanorado.

The meeting was previously arranged by correspondence, and the subject before the conference was as

to whether the state line could be made a public highway. There has been considerable annoyance and inconvenience among the people who live near the line occasioned by the fact that the section lines in Kansas and those in Colorado are not continuous lines.

The jog makes for the end of the road for the traveler going either way across the line, and since in many cases the state line has been fenced, there is no way through the wire fences.

The fact that this seemingly natural highway has been made more or less inaccessible of travel, the county commissioners of these two counties are anxious to have an open highway along their territory.

From Kanorado to a point about four miles south along the state line, the commissioners of Kit Carson County, by a petition from the people, have opened a highway on the Colorado side, 30 feet wide, which is but half of the standard

highway. They think it is no more than right that Kansas should give the other thirty feet.

The conference took place in the Germann hotel, and besides the commissioners there were a good many interested people to express their views in the matter. All the farmers want the road open, but the large cattle owners are better satisfied with the conditions as they now exist.

They build miles of drift fence along the state line and turn their cattle into "all out doors," as there is free range in Colorado. The minute they get across into Kansas, there is a reverse law, and the owner of stock is responsible if they trespass or get into growing crops.
