Water Testing—The Northwest Local Environmental Protection Group does well evaluations, including testing for bacteria and nitrates. To schedule an evaluation or discuss environmental concerns, call the Health Department at 899-4888.

The group charges a \$50 letter of intent fee (similar to a permit) which is good for one year. It is required on the installation or modification of all septic systems in the protection group's area.

The group will continue to offer free testing to private individuals. However, if you are selling, purchasing or refinancing any property that requires an inspection, the group will charge a \$90 inspection fee. The inspection includes site evaluations on well and septic systems and testing the water. The group will also charge a \$25 fee for child care and foster care inspections.

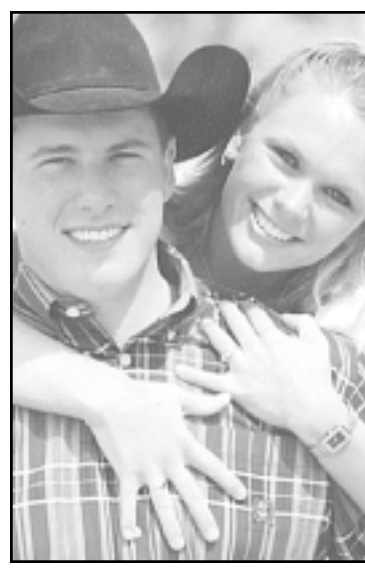
November wedding planned

Kanorado creamery station had busy summer today in history

Sherman County Historical Society August 23, 1905: The Kanorado receiving station of the Continental Creamery has been handling a great deal of cream this summer. The amount paid the patrons for the month of July was \$884.23. It is safe to say that this station will do a business for the year around the \$9,000 mark.

August 24, 1905: Law Suit Over Cattle—An echo of the celebrated Dewey-Berry feud came up in the supreme court in Topeka, last week. It is a cattle case in which Beach Berry was the plaintiff, in the lower court, and got a judgment for \$500 against Matt Mahoney, sheriff of Rawlins County. The sheriff appealed the case.

today in history

The action now filed in the supreme court was begun in September, 1902, while all the Berrys were alive. Sheriff Mahoney of Rawlins County came out to Beach Berry's farm and attached seven cows and 14 steers, which were claimed under mortgage by the Reeves Commission company.

As a result of the cows being taken away, their seven calves died of starvation. Beach Berry sued for \$630. The Reeves company claimed that the mortgage had been placed on the cattle by Beach Berry's father and brother. Beach showed that the cattle belonged to him and got a judgment for \$500.

Beach Berry is a son of Daniel P. Berry and a brother of Birch and Alpheus Berry, who were all killed in the fight with the Dewey ranchers. He is a cousin of Roy Berry, who was badly wounded.

August 25, 1905: William Ennis Is Back—William Ennis, accompanied by his wife, returned home from Chicago, the latter part of last week, where he had been to receive treatment for a cancerous growth at the cardiac end of the stomach.

Mr. Ennis looks quite well, except that his friends notice that he has lost a little flesh, which may have been occasioned by living in the heat of that big city.
