


### Man to turn 95 **Saturday**

### Kanorado creamery station had busy summer today in history

Sherman County Historical Society August 23, 1905: The Kanorado receiving station of the Continental Creamery has been handling a great deal of cream this summer. The amount paid the patrons for the month of July was \$884.23. It is safe to say that this station will do a business for the year around the \$9,000

August 24, 1905: Law Suit Over Cattle — An echo of the celebrated Dewey-Berry feud came up in the supreme court in Topeka, last week. It is a cattle case in which Beach Berry was the plaintiff, in the lower court, and got a judgment for \$500 against Matt Mahoney, sheriff of Rawlins County. The sheriff appealed the case.

The action now filed in the supreme court was begun in September, 1902, while all the Berrys were Alpheus Berry, who were all killed alive. Sheriff Mahoney of Rawlins in the fight with the Dewey ranch-County came out to Beach Berry's farm and attached seven cows and 14 steers, which were claimed under mortgage by the Reeves Commission company.
