The 2005 college football season the NCAA Division II national kicks off Thursday with at least 10 games across the nation, all involving NCAA Division II teams.

Four other Division II teams open their seasons on Friday. Nearly all the remaining teams will play their first game on Saturday, along with about a quarter of the teams belonging to the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics.

The majority of junior college teams also open their seasons on Saturday, including all eight football-playing schools of the Kansas Jayhawk Community College Con-

Sophomore Jared Doke and the Blue Dragons of Hutchinson Community College will try to get their first win of the season when they visit Memorial Stadium in Dodge City to face the Conquistadors.

Freshmen David Livengood and Derrick Raymer will be on the field for their first college football game when Garden City Community College plays host to Fort Scott Community College.

Hutchinson is ranked No. 16 in the National Junior College Athletic Association preseason poll while Garden City is No. 24.

Others like the idea of playing weaker teams so they can open their seasons with three or four straight home games.
