Crafters have new market for wares

Those high priced craft malls you find in Denver and Wichita have a new competitor right here in

Cobblestone Floral and Garden has expanded to add crafts booths for local artisans.

The front room of the flower shop has been transformed into a mini

Each booth is sectioned off with white lattice, separating each seller's wares.

Ashleigh Flodin, who owns of the flower shop with her husband Edward, said the mall is a chance for talented crafters in the area to sell

"There are a lot of very crafty people around," she said. '

"These people are very tal-

So far, the mall features leather goods, woodworking, oil paintings, jewelry, plants, silks, birdhouses

"I think we have a little bit of ev-started," she said. erything for everyone," Flodin said. "It's very diverse."

Flodin said they have openings for every type of crafts and ser-

She said if you make wedding cakes, have small antiques to sell, take photographs or anything, the space is perfect.

The shop offers booths in sizes including 3 feet by 3 feet by 4 feet, 4 by 4 by 4, 5 by 5 by 4 and window booths that are 13 by 5

Cobblestone charges \$20, \$30, \$40 and \$50 per month for the booths, along with an 18 percent percent on items on consign-

Anyone who signs up for space must start with a minimum of three months, but Flodin said they could share a booth with a friend.

Crafters are given price tags that include the booth number so employees can identify the account. Flodin said the shop takes care of sales tax and bankcard fees.

Each account holder gets a check and an invoice once a month.

The shop provides hooks for lattice displays, she said, but crafters can add shelves, holders, bulletin boards or signs as they

'We have everything to get them 899-3663.

Flodin said crafters can remain anonymous or identify themselves.

The crafters, she said, are responsible for keeping their items in

If they run out, though, store em-

ployees will alert them. Flodin said she wants to preserve the original business and plans to keep the flowers, bedding plants and small gifts that have been a

The business has been Cobblestone for the past seven years, three of which Flodin has been in

staple over the years.

She said the business was called commission on items sold and 30 Goodland Greenhouse before

The idea for the craft mall came from visiting similar malls in Denver, where she is from.

"We're very excited," Flodin said. "It's been very positive."

She said once the booths are full, the mall may extend into a back

When that's full, she said, they want to add a used bookstore.

Cobblestone is open from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday and 8:30 a.m. to noon on Satur-

Saturday, the festival revs up with the car and motorcycle shows on Main Avenue.
