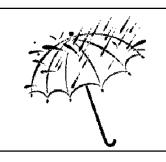
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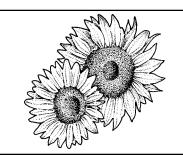
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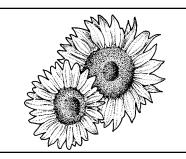


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Good job, Goodland Swimmers, for a fine season, for raising your ownmoney and for promoting team growth!

Swim team grows despite having to raise own money

If you are part of Goodland's swim team, fees, you conduct your own fund-raisers, and you give your support to the team and work to build it up.

Goodland's swimming pool closed at the end of the 1999 season and was closed through 2000 while being replaced with the new Steever Water Park. The team dropped from about 50 members to 12 in 2000, when they all had to drive to Colby to practice.

The next year, Coach Glenna Jarmin said, the team gained a few swimmers when the new pool opened, but then lost some because the water was too cold and ended up with about 15. The team also lost financial support from the city.

The city used to sponsor the team and pay use the pool. The team pays its fees and buys supplies from money in its account from past years, she said; most of the work is done by volunteers, and parents do fund-

The team needs the parents involved, Jarmin said; they have to take their kids to the meets, and there's work on the computer and a lot of other things to do when Goodland serves as a meet's host.

Gennifer House did the computer work coaches, Jarmin said, but now just lets them at this year's meet, Jarmin said; two years ago, Goodland held a meet because Colby's team couldn't get their pool for it. People from Colby helped with that meet, she said.

There's also the need to send letters and e-mails to keep everyone informed, she said; it takes more than a few people.

And the swimmers do better if they practice through the winter. The team goes to the Colby Community College pool once at the Northwest Kansas League Champia month during the winter, Jarmin said, and

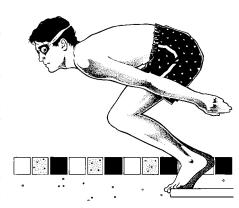
holds some practices at the Howard The team had several first-place indi- Johnson Hotel. They practice mostly on

distance. The team did this last winter, the coach said, and the ones who took the time to do it benefited. The coach said the benefits of off-season practice show up in the competition as well.

Colby dominates the meets, she said; they have a lot of swimmers, and they have the college pool right there. Jarmin said she thinks the Colby team uses the indoor pool once a week during the winter rather than once a month like the Goodland team.

Besides the dedication of swimmers who practice during the winter, Jarmin also appreciates the parents who take the time and effort to drive their kids over to Colby to

"I credit the parents for doing this for their kids," she said.



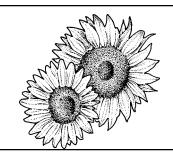


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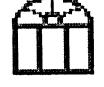


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
