Are consumers getting gouged with fuel prices?

Dear Attorney General Kline:

I just filled my car with gas and can't believe how high the prices are. And what's worse is they continue to rise. Isn't this price gouging?

Dear Kansas Consumer:

With gasoline prices at or near record levels, this is a question frequently being asked by consumers in Kansas and across the country.

The Kansas Consumer Protection Act provides broad protections against unconscionable pricing in general, not just for gasoline. In its simplest terms, an "uncon-

scionable" price is a price that far exceeds what the current market conditions would justify. As consumers, we need to be

aware that during normal market conditions, price fluctuations of 20 or 30 percent can frequently be justified, depending on market conditions, even when those factors are not readily apparent to the public.

Since gasoline prices are among the most volatile of prices in our economy today, when the prices change, we all notice it.

But like most goods, the price of gasoline can change for a number of reasons — seasonal driving habits affect gasoline prices and weather patterns alter the demand for fuel, while refinery problems and political considerations in OPEC countries affect fuel supplies, which cause the price of crude oil to increase, which in turn can cause prices at the pump to increase.

It is unlikely that any violation of Kansas law will be triggered until a station's price per gallon grossly exceeds the price of the same product in similar markets.

If the supplier cannot provide a legal basis for the substantial difference, then the Consumer Protection Act's prohibitions and possible penalties may be applied.

The Kansas Consumer Protection laws exist to remedy true price gouging, not to regulate supplydriven fluctuations or to fix gas prices at a level we would all prefer to be paying.


Nothing in the consumer protection act attempts to set the market price, but it does provide a means to punish those who act with the intent to defraud or abuse the public
