Whooping cough on rise in Kansas

Whooping cough is on the rise in Fever, if present, is usually mild. Kansas, and the Goodland Regional Medical Center is urging people days (average seven to 10) after exwith symptoms to see their doctor.

The whoop is heard when the patient struggles to breathe. The cough usually produces thick mucus, and the patient is left exhausted.

cold or flu-like symptoms, includincreasingly severe coughing spells. diphtheria shots, Younger said.

Symptoms usually appear six to 21 posure to the bacteria.

If you or a member of your family has symptoms, said Dr. David Younger, including a cough for two weeks or longer, without other explanation, contact your doctor. Medications can treat the infection and relieve the symptoms, he said.

The Center for Disease Control and Prevention urges people who suspect they have pertussis to limit contact with unvaccinated children and see a doctor as soon as possible, Younger said.
