

Indians run over Cowboys 30-6

Sixteen seconds was all it took to transform a scoreless tie into a 16-0 lead for St. Francis in the first quarter of the game Friday against the visiting Goodland Cowboys.

The Indians went on to win 30-6. After a scoreless second quarter, St. Francis added eight more points about halfway through the third period and led 24-0 after three. The Cowboys got on the scoreboard just after the start of the fourth quarter on a touchdown pass from senior Wyatt Dautel to senior Jase Herl. The two-point conversion attempt failed.

About five minutes later, St. Francis responded with its fourth touchdown, making the score 30-6. The next Goodland drive ended on downs after a quarterback sack and the Indians were able to hang on to the ball for the rest of the game.

"We got an old-fashioned butt-whipping," said Cowboys coach Jon McLean. "We just did not play well at all."

About three minutes into the game's opening drive, St. Francis scored on a 7-yard pass play from quarterback Matt Brown to Adam Peter, giving the Indians a 6-0 lead. Jordan Gienger then ran in the two-point conversion to make it 8-0.

Goodland senior Wyatt Dautel returned the kickoff to the Cowboys' 47, but a fumble on their first play from scrimmage gave the ball back to the Indians with a first-and-10 on Goodland's 36. On the next play, Gienger ran all the way to the end zone, and with the two-point

conversion on a run by Dylan Loyd, the Indians led 16-0.

Twice in the second quarter, Goodland turned the ball over, on a fumble and later an interception, but the Indians could not cash in. The teams went into their locker rooms at half-time with the score still 16-0.

On the second play after the second half kickoff, St. Francis recovered another Cowboy fumble and drove 38 yards on 11 plays, scoring

on a 2-yard run by Gienger. A pass from Brown to Peter for the two-point conversion made it 24-0.

With over two minutes left in the third, Goodland started a drive which took the Cowboys down to the St. Francis 27 as time ran out.

Two plays after the teams switched ends, Dautel connected with Herl for a 27-yard pass play for a touchdown. The run for the two-point conversion came up short, leaving the score 24-6.

Three plays after the subsequent kickoff it was the Cowboys' turn to recover a fumble, with Herl jumping on the loose ball. However on the very next play, Dautel was hit just as he released the ball for a pass and it was intercepted.

Next, the Indians went on a 70-yard drive, capped by a 5-yard touchdown run by Joel McAtee to give St. Francis a 30-6 lead. The Indians' pass attempt for the two-point conversion failed.

Senior Heath Chatfield returned the kickoff 27 yards to the Goodland 43, but on fourth down and three, Dautel was sacked for a 6-yard loss and St. Francis took over on downs.

The Indians were able to sustain a grinding drive, picking up three first-downs along the way, eating up over five minutes then took a knee for the game's final play.

Both teams are now 1-1 for the season.

The Cowboys were outgained 333 yards to 116. The Indians ran for 315 and passed for 18 yards while Goodland rushed for 51 and threw for 65. St. Francis held the edge in first downs 12-7.

Dautel finished the game completing five of 13 passes for 65 yards and a touchdown. He was intercepted twice. Dautel also rushed for 10 yards on eight carries.

Herl caught four of Dautel's passes, including the touchdown, for 53 yards. Chatfield had a 12-yard reception.

Senior fullback Bob Miller ran 10 times for 18 yards. Sophomore Casey Henderson gained 10 yards on five carries, Herl seven yards on two rushes and junior Jarrod Goodman six yards on two carries.

On defense, Herl led the Cowboys with 20 tackles and a fumble recovery. Both Miller and Henderson had 13 tackles, and senior Brandon Tatman had 12. Senior Mark Starr and junior Jon Cook both had nine tackles.

The Indians' ground attack was led by Gienger who gained 204 yards on 18 carries scoring two touchdowns. Gabe Smull ran 17 times for 75 yards and one touchdown.

St. Francis enjoyed the edge in turnovers 5-1.

Goodland returns to Cowboy Stadium on Friday night to face Rawlins County High of Atwood. The Buffaloes are 0-2 for the season after losing to Oakley 28-6. St. Francis travels to Quinter for its first road trip of the season.

Broncbusters unhorsed in Texas

The Garden City Community College football team came up short in Texas Saturday, losing to the Wranglers of Cisco Junior College 22-19 in a non-conference matchup.

The loss dropped the Broncbusters' overall record to 2-1, however they remain 2-0 in the Kansas Jayhawk Community College Conference. Garden City returns to conference play Saturday when it faces the visiting Grizzlies of Butler County Community College.

Butler County improved to 3-0 overall, 2-0 conference, on Saturday after pounding Highland Community College 76-0.

In other games around the confer-

ence, Coffeyville beat Hutchinson 62-6, Dodge City defeated Independence 38-16 and Fort Scott lost to Northeastern Oklahoma A&M College 63-7.

Garden City climbed from No. 24 to No. 11 in last week's National Junior College Athletic Association's poll after beating Independence 30-0 on Sept. 3.

In that game, former Goodland Cowboy David Livengood, now a freshman running back for the Broncbusters, picked up seven yards on three carries. Freshman Derrick Raymer, another ex-Cowboy, punted seven times for Garden City, averaging over 24 yards per

kick. Both Livengood and Raymer are 2005 graduates of Goodland High. As seniors, both players were first-team all-league picks by the Northwest Kansas League.

Butler County climbed to the top of the poll last week after starting the season 2-0 including a win over Trinity Valley Community College (Texas), a preseason top 25 team. The Grizzlies were No. 3 in the preseason poll. Coffeyville climbed up five spots to No. 4.

Coffeyville plays host to Dodge City on Saturday while Hutchinson visits Independence and Highland travels to Fort Scott.
