Indians run over Cowboys 30-6

Sixteen seconds was all it took to transform a scoreless tie into a 16-0 lead for St. Francis in the first quarter of the the game Friday against the visiting Goodland Cow-

The Indians went on to win 30-6. After a scoreless second quarter, St. Francis added eight more points about halfway through the third period and led 24-0 after three. The Cowboys got on the scoreboard just after the start of the fourth quarter on a touchdown pass from senior Wyatt Dautel to senior Jase Herl. The two-point conversion attempt

About five minutes later, St. Francis responded with its fourth touchdown, making the score 30-6. The next Goodland drive ended on downs after a quarterback sack and the Indians were able to hang on to the ball for the rest of the game.

"We got an old-fashioned buttwhipping," said Cowboys coach Jon Mclean. "We just did not play

About three minutes into the game's opening drive, St. Francis scored on a 7-yard pass play from quarterback Matt Brown to Adam Peter, giving the Indians a 6-0 lead. Jordan Gienger then ran in the twopoint conversion to make it 8-0.


