September 23, 1905: Much building going on — The building boom in Goodland still continues. For about two years, houses and substantial and costly business blocks have been erected.

There is no abatement, but rather an increase, especially in the putting up of houses for permanent resi-

dences and for the purpose of rent. The demand is still in excess of the supply. We mention those now being completed, others commenced, and still others contemplated.

The two fine residences built by E. Thorson on "Railroad Row" are now complete. Just north of the Ratcliffe house, built about a year ago, Mr. Pickenpaugh is putting up a very nice cottage home. It has four gables, is of modern design and has three nice rooms, a closet and a bathroom in the upper story.

Dr. F.H. Smith's residence on Boulevard approaches completion, both commodious and elegant. It is rather unique in design with pagoda gables, broad verandas, bay and Venetian windows. It will be steam heated, has bathroom fixtures, etc. (Historic Note: Located at 1312 Main, Dr. Smith's house is now used as the administrative offices for the Goodland school system.)

John Hartzler has commenced a

residence on the corner of East 13th and Broadway. The extreme dimensions are 28x40, besides bathroom and closets. It will have a large bay window facing west and ample porches.

A.B. Yarnell will build a small hotel on the lots just north of the Fred Bock house. Preliminary to the work, he is now erecting a frame barn, which can be used temporarily as a carpenter shop.

Commissioner J.W. Klauer is building a house 24x26 on lots just south of the Lew Brinker home in the southwest part of town, with four rooms besides the pantry and closets. W.L. White is putting up a three-room house in the same part of town for Mike Burt, and several more small houses are projected in the same locality.

Glen Filer is building a house for William Bode, 24x24, four rooms besides pantry and closets. The V.W. Goodrich small tenement is now

complete and occupied; and also one block east erected by Jasper Gandy for a railroad employee.

The Grady Grant house is nearly finished. The additions to the Nelson and Tapper houses are about finished. Two small houses on the east side of Boulevard are nearly done and the Steiges house in the north part of town.

C.M. Millisack is putting up a large square house just east of his residence. R.A. Kent and Mrs. Marshall are building in the south part of town. J.W. Smith is building a barn on lots to the rear of the property bought of Fred Dawson. Carpenters are in great demand, and some desiring to build are hindered by this lack.

Quilt to raise money for shelves, relief

The Goodland Churches Thrift Store is raising money for shelves and for disaster relief, using a quilt and a jar.

A bright "string quilt," 48X63 inches, is hanging in the window at the thrift store and may be displayed at a church on Sunday as part of the store's fund-raiser. The quilt, made by Mary Ellen Coumerilh, will be given away in a drawing Tuesday, Nov. 15.

The goal, said Thrift Store Manager Jo Simmons, is to raise \$500 each for shelves and for hurricane relief. The store also has a jar for donations to hurricane relief.

The money raised for relief will be split between the Red Cross and the

Salvation Army, Simmons said. String quilts were made by pioneer women on the High Plains as a frugal way to use every little piece of fabric, including still usable sections of worn clothing.

The strips of fabric, too narrow to be used for anything else, were stitched onto a foundation, sometimes old newspapers or a worn out quilt.

Coumerilh made the quilt from fabric recycled from collars, cuffs and narrow scraps from garments bought in thrift stores. The backing is made from recycled calico cafe curtains. Only the bright blue border is not recycled; it is from the quiltmaker's personal stash.
