Sophomore Eryn Toppliff had the best round of the junior varsity competition with a 14-over-par 50. Sophomore Renea Reasoner shot an 83.

The Cowgirls are at the Bentwood Golf Course in Ulysses today. Goodland's junior varsity will visit the Tamarisk Golf Course in Syracuse on Thursday.

Mustangs run invitational

The Grant Junior High School cross country teams ran at the Ogallala Invitational on Thursday in Nebraska.

Eric Ross led the Mustangs finishing the one-mile course in 6 minutes, 6 seconds, placing fifth. Chris Bustillos finished 11th in 6:20 and Michael Pettibone was 13th in 6:29.

Dane Frazier ran a 7:03 for 19th place and Chase Sawatzky ran 7:20 for 20th. Other Mustangs competing were Lee Prine, 23rd in 8:29; Tanner

Fairchild, 25th in 9:25; and Brandan Flodin, 26th in 12:40.

The Lady Mustangs were led by P.A. Gonzales, who finished 13th among the girls in 7:24. Caitlyn McGinley was 15th in 7:56 and Tancia Arnold 16th in 8:01. Other girls running for Grant were Jessi Geist, 20th in 8:39; Day Waugh, 21st in 9:15; and Kaitlyn Lammers, 22nd in 9:41.

"These athletes did a great job," said Mustang coach Richard Schwasinger.

Fort Hays State wins second game

Fort Hays State University won its second football game of the season Saturday, defeating the visiting Grizzlies of Adams State College (Colo.) 18-15 at Lewis Field Stadium.

After a scoreless first quarter, the Grizzlies got on the scoreboard first with a 14-yard touchdown run about two minutes into the second period.

The Tigers came back with a 48-yard field goal about four minutes to make it 7-3, then scored on a 32-yarder about four minutes after that.

Fort Hays State took the lead 12-7 with 15 seconds left in the half on a 10-yard run by senior quarterback Reed Gottula.

The two-point conversion attempt failed and the teams went into the locker room with the Tigers enjoying a five-point lead.

The only scoring in the third quarter was sophomore placekicker Justin Barr's third field goal of the game, this time from 20 yards away, to make the score 15-7.

Adams State scored three seconds into the fourth quarter on a short touchdown run then passed for the two-point conversion to tie the game at 15.

With just one minute left in the game, the Tigers broke the tie on 27-yard field goal by Barr.

The Grizzlies subsequent drive stalled and Fort Hays State took over on downs and was able to run

out the final 28 seconds for the win.

Barr connected on all four of his field goal attempts from 48, 32, 20 and 27 yards.

The Tigers improve to 2-3 overall and 2-1 in the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference.

Adams State also is now 2-3 overall and 2-1 in the conference.

The Orediggers of the Colorado School of Mines visit Hays on Saturday.

Colorado Mines defeated Chadron State College (Neb.) Saturday 27-26 and also is 2-3 overall.

In other games around the conference Saturday, Mesa State College (Colo.) helped celebrate its homecoming with a 28-17 victory

over Western New Mexico University in a non-conference matchup; Fort Lewis College (Colo.) defeated Western State College of Colorado 28-17; and the University of Nebraska at Kearney spoiled New Mexico Highlands' homecoming, beating the Cowboys 59-21.

This coming Saturday, Chadron State travels to Fort Lewis, Mesa State plays host to Western State and Adams State heads to Kearney.

New Mexico Highlands visits Northwestern Oklahoma State University for a non-conference game.

Butler and Coffeyville keep winning streak

Butler County and Coffeyville community colleges remained perfect for the season after Saturday's football action, both improving to 5-0 overall and 4-0 in the Kansas Jayhawk Community College Conference.

The Grizzlies of Butler County, ranked No. 1 by the National Junior College Athletic Association, dominated Fort Scott Community College 49-0.

Hutchinson on Saturday to take on the Blue Dragons.

The Red Ravens of Coffeyville, ranked No. 3 by the association, beat Independence Community College 46-7.

The Greyhounds of Fort Scott, who are still looking for their first win of the season, visits Coffeyville on Saturday.

The Broncbusters of Garden City Community College broke a two-game losing streak Saturday, de-

feating Dodge City Community College 30-22.

The Busters are now 3-2 overall and 3-1 in the conference.

Garden City is home this weekend and will face the Scotties of Highland Community College with the opening kickoff around 7 p.m. (Mountain Time) Saturday at Memorial Stadium.

The Scotties are 2-3 after defeating Graceland University's junior varsity 35-12 on Sunday.

Hutchinson improved to 3-2 Saturday after defeating the U.S. Air Force Prep School 54-24 in Colorado Springs.

The future cadets travel to Dodge City on Saturday to face the Conquistadors.

The Pirates of Independence, 1-4 overall, go on the road to play the junior varsity of McPherson College on Wednesday.

Sterling College beat Southwestern College two weekends ago 35-0 to remain perfect for the season at 2-0.

The Warriors, who were off this weekend, made their season debut in the top 25 this week at No. 25. Sterling travels to North Newton on Saturday to take on the Threshers of Bethel.

The Swedes of Bethany won their first game of the season, at home, Saturday defeating Southwestern College 26-22. The Swedes, now 1-2 overall, lost to Ottawa University 26-7 on Sept. 17.

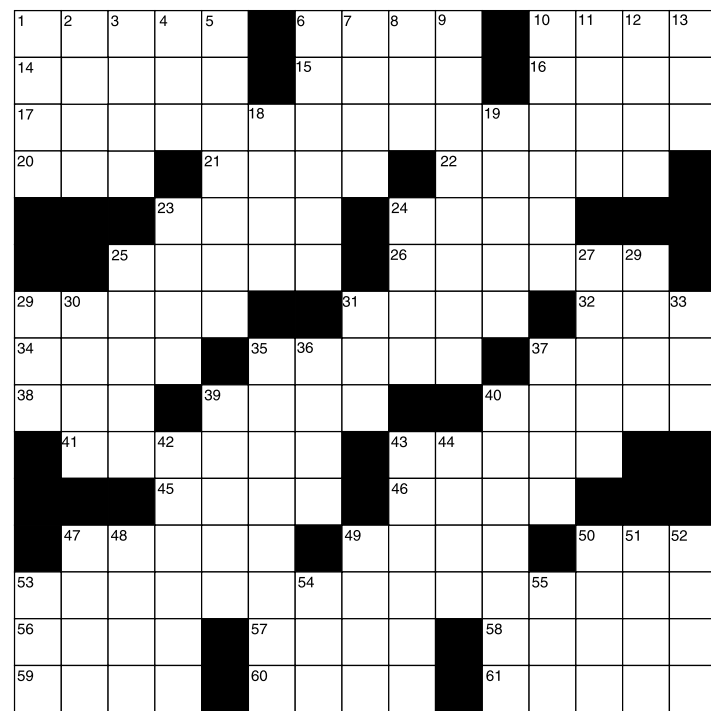
