Kansas, Colorado split cost of Beecher monument

Sherman County Historical Society October 4, 1905: Kansas Sends \$2,500 for Beecher Island Monument—Awarrant for \$2,500 passed from the state of Kansas to the state of Colorado to pay the Kansas share, which is half of the cost of erecting a \$5,000 monument at Beecher Island, Yuma County, Colo.

Colorado has already paid over the \$2,500, and it has also donated to the Beecher Island Battle Memorial association a large tract of land at the scene of the battle, to be known as Beecher Park. It will be used forever as a state park. It is located a few miles across the Colorado line.
