Colby accident kills former grocer

Two people were killed in Colby on Saturday night when the motorcycle they were riding and a Ford Excursion collided in front of the bowling alley on Range Ave.

motorcycle, and his passenger, Roberta F. Casey, 58, both of Colby, were pronounced dead at Citizens Medical Center.

The driver of the 2003 Ford Excursion, Dawnelle L. Umberger, 33, of Levant, and her 7-year-old passenger, Kaity R. Meador, were not injured.

State troopers said the accident happened when the driver of the Excursion made a left turn into the Colby Bowl and Fun Center about 8:30 p.m. in front of the 2003 Yamaha motorcycle, which was headed north. The motorcycle struck the left front corner of the vehicle, killing both riders, the Kansas Highway Patrol reported.

Troopers said they weren't certain whether Blau was wearing a helmet, but did say his passenger, Casey, was not. Umberger and her passenger in the Excursion both were wearing seat belts.

Mr. Blau was born Sept. 9, 1950, at Colby. He had worked at Boogarts in Goodland and was area manager for the grocery chain before taking a job with Hi-Plains Coop in Colby.

The free lecture, "How the conservatives won the Heart of America," will begin at 6 p.m. Mountain Time.

In a book called "brilliant" by the Boston Globe, Frank set out to find answers to the questions: Why do so many Americans vote against their own economic interests? Why aren't Americans demanding corporate accountability? Why aren't Americans angrier about job outsourcing and layoffs than about a public display of the Ten Commandments? How did corporate executives convince Americans that they speak for the little guy? Why would small farmers cast votes in favor of an economic system that will eventually push them off their land?

Frank's search for the answers to these questions brought him to the very heart of America, the state in which he grew up, Kansas.

He researched the history of William Quantrill and John Brown, of Boeing and Raytheon, of Rep. Todd Tiahart and Sen. Sam Brownback, and even blew the dust off of a forgotten 1896 essay called, "What's the Matter with Kansas?" by William Allen White.

After contemplating his travels throughout the state, Frank wrote 'What's the Matter with Kansas?" an analysis not only of Kansas' conservative-liberal gap but of the bitter divide between moderate and conservative Republicans.

The New York Times called 'What's the Matter with Kansas?" "the best political book of the year," as it continues to grace the paper's best-seller list week after week.
