# Ground was broken on two-story brick hotel

**October 14, 1905:** Work On Hotel Commences—Ground was broken for the new two-story brick hotel Tuesday. The ground dimensions are to be 34x80 with a basement under the entire building, which will extend three feet above the sidewalk. The main entrance will be at the southwest corner.

The hotel will be several feet higher than the Leonard brick building.

(Historic Note: This hotel is on the northeast corner of 10th and Main. In later years, it was known as the Neu Hotel, being owned by the Neu family. The upper floor was added by the Neu brothers. For several years it was known as the Goodland Hotel. This structure became known as the Centennial Building in 1987 when Goodland celebrated it first 100 years. The Leonard Brick is the building just to the north at 921 Main.)

**October 15, 1905:** Goodland will soon have a fine band. The boys played on the street Sunday afternoon for the first time. It was their initial spiel in public, and most of their audience were agreeably surprised at their playing.

They have been "tooting their horns" for some time and have made good progress. C.J. Willis, a fine band instructor, had been engaged for a year to instruct and drill the band. Mr. Willis, accompanied by his wife and son, arrived in Goodland Thursday morning. Mrs. Willis is a daughter of Dr.

and Mrs. Farrow. They lived here some years ago, and Mr. Willis was in the confectionery business but removed to Chicago later, where he was in business.

A good band and orchestra is a desideratum of any up-to-date town. The people of Goodland should be congratulated on the prospect of having a fine band. Mr. Willis is both a fine musician and a first class instructor and band manager. Commendable enterprise has been shown in securing his services.

**October 16, 1905:** Kansas-Colo- rado Suit—Arkansas River Case To Be Heard A Year Hence—WASHINGTON, October 16 — The supreme court today set the second Tuesday in October, next year, as the day for argument in the Kansas-Colo- rado case in which the state of Kansas is endeavoring to prevent the state of Colorado from diverting the waters of the Arkansas river.

**October 17, 1905:** LITTLE NEWSSES: The Goodland brass band gave a concert on the streets, Sunday. The band has plenty of good material and the younger boys who have taken up the playing of instruments are doing well. Push the good work along, and let Goodland, as in days of old, maintain a fine band.

# Television brings disasters into homes

The recent national disaster of Hurricane Katrina showed us that the effects of such an event go far beyond those who are most directly involved, especially when television and the news brings the experience right into our homes.

Children, as well as adults, can have a hard time dealing with the things they see on television and what they hear others talking about.

It is very important to limit children's television and Internet viewing of such events. Older children and adolescents can benefit, but they still should not spend a lot of time watching coverage of disaster-related events.

And when they do, parents, teachers and other adults need to stay involved and encourage healthy discussion about what they have seen.

Parents should be especially mindful of young children's viewing, and for some, it would even be appropriate to completely avoid watching news reports.

Even children who live far from the disaster will worry that the same thing could happen where they live. Children of any age may ask questions that even adults have difficulty answering.

They may have difficulty processing the extent of the destruction

and the nationwide effect and will look to parents and other adults in their lives for reassurance. Parents need to acknowledge those feelings, allowing

the children time to talk and letting them know their reactions are normal.

Children should be encouraged to be realistic, and parents should take a positive attitude. Adults need to help children understand that bad things can happen, but there are solutions to even the worst situations.

If a child's fears continue beyond a reasonable length of time, or he exhibits unusual behaviors, such as excessive worrying, depression, dif-

ficulty sleeping or persistent thoughts of doom, it may be time to seek additional help.

Parents should talk to their family physician, minister, teachers, school counselor or a mental health professional for further information and assistance.
