College to celebrate opening of new library

The Northwest Kansas Technical College has added a new library to meet the requirements of its accreditation process and has the money for equipment, books, subscriptions and updated technology thanks to \$45,000 from public grants and a foundation.

The college will celebrate the opening of its new library with an open house and dedication from 2-4 p.m. Thursday.

Tiffany Shank-Jones, a Goodland resident and former elementary teacher, was hired in January as librarian. The project received money from the Garvey Texas Foundation and three public grants.

The college has entered the five-year accreditation process with the Higher Learning Commission-North Central, and a central campus

library is required. Carol Garvey Sweat of Wallace, representing the Garvey Texas Foundation of Fort Worth, granted \$10,000 to help the library to buy equipment, books and reference subscriptions.

A total of \$50,000 was budgeted from federal money under the Library Services and Technology Act to the state Library Commission, Shelly Jones, publications and event coordinator at the college. The college received a \$5,000 special population grant from the commission for learning-disabled students.

This grant bought Kurzweil Reader Software, computer and scanner. After scanning a textbook, students can listen to a pleasant human-like synthetic voice reading the text and follow the written word

on the computer screen.

A talking word processor program pronounces the text as you type and will read aloud a scanned test to a student.

Another grant of \$25,000 was awarded to the college from the Kan-ed Enhancing Technology Grant program to help update video conferencing equipment. The college bought two machines to replace its video conferencing services.

A \$5,000 grant was received from the state Library Commission under the Library Services and Technology Act technology grant. It bought the library circulation and card catalog software programs, plus a computer, scanner and barcode gun for check-in and check-out of collection materials.

Items from the library collection may be used by students, faculty, staff and others. The collection will include items covering each department on campus along with general reference and study skills materials. A library lounge area with comfortable seating, study tables, newspapers and magazines is available.

Computer workstations have complete Internet access and software available for use during and after classroom hours. Databases providing extensive research materials are available for all library patrons.

If the library does not have something you are looking for, it can be ordered through Inter-Library Loan. Northwest Kansas Technical College is a member of the Northwest Kansas Library System based in Norton.
