Two fumbles in the first two minutes of Friday's football game with Concordia put the Cowboys behind, and that's where they stayed as the Panthers ran up a 55-19 vic-

On the play after Goodland's second fumble, the Panthers scored on an 18-yard touchdown run for a 6-0 lead. Concordia scored two more touchdowns in the period and led 20-0 going into the second quarter.

The Cowboys got on the scoreboard on a 3-yard touchdown run by senior Derek Fenner, and with the extra point kick, narrowed the margin to 20-7. The Panthers responded on their next possession with a touchdown to make the score 28-7, which is how the first half ended.

Concordia scored touchdowns on its first two possessions to make it 41-7, after which Goodland was able to mount a 79-yard drive capped by a 1-yard touchdown plunge by Fenner to make it 41-13. Three plays later, the Panthers got their seventh touchdown to widen their lead to 48-13.

With about four minutes left in the game, Fenner scored again from one yard out to make the score 48-19, but the Panthers scored another touchdown two plays later to make the final 55-19.

"Once again, fumbles killed us," said Cowboys coach Jon McLean. Goodland gave up four fumbles, the two early in the game, another early in the third quarter and the last one in the early seconds of the fourth period.
