Waterworks standpipe was nearly complete

Sherman County Historical Society November 1, 1905: The new standpipe of the water works is progressing toward completion. Water was pumped into the pipe Nov. 1, for the purpose of starting the "float" on which the workmen will stand and work until the structure is complete.

The work is of the most substantial character and excels by far the work and material on the ordinary standpipe erected in the country. The iron of the structure is heavier and the foundation broader and deeper than usually required.
