Water Testing — The Northwest Local Environmental Protection Group does well evaluations, including testing for bacteria and nitrates. To schedule an evaluation or discuss environmental concerns, call the Health Department at 890-4888.

The group charges a \$50 letter of intent fee (similar to a permit) which is good for one year. It is required on the installation or modification of all septic systems in the protection group's area.

The group will continue to offer free testing to private individuals. However, if you are selling, purchasing or refinancing any property that requires an inspection, the group will charge a \$90 inspection fee. The inspection includes site evaluations on well and septic systems and testing the water. The group will also charge a \$25 fee for child care and foster care inspections.

Sherman County man was called for jury in U.S. District Court today in history

November 8, 1905: William A. Sexson of Grant Township received notice that he was one of the jurors drawn to serve in the session of the U.S. District Court, which sits in Topeka this month. Mr. Sexson is notified to be in Topeka for jury service Nov. 27.

November 9, 1905: Among Our Neighbors — (This paper would like an active correspondent in every neighborhood in Sherman County.) Kanorado News — J.W. Germann reports that he has purchased at this point 35 cars of grain. He stores it in his elevator and ships the product to Kansas City. Walker & Jackson also buy grain at this point. — The dedication of the newly built church here will take place Sunday, Nov. 12. Presiding elder Meredith will be present to deliver the dedicatory address, and the occasion is looked forward to with much interest by the people of the town and the surrounding country. The building has cost \$1,700, and has been practically paid for by popular subscription. The interior is nicely decorated; is provided with an organ, pulpit furniture, etc. and has an extra assembly room which can be joined to the church room by opening and swinging back folding doors. Rev. Armstrong is the resident pastor.

Ruleton News — The Kanorado minister was in the neighborhood last week raising funds with which to clear the remaining indebtedness on the church there. Nearly everyone helped him and thus manifested their duty in a religious way. — Ruleton is on the boom. A real estate office and a butcher shop are going to be built soon. Lots are sell-

ing fast. — The Ruleton market: wheat, 60 cents; barley, 22 cents; butter, 14 cents; eggs, 14 cents. — Grant township is busy putting out fall wheat. And her wheat fame will extend afar next year. If the people would only put out more wheat and do good farming, Sherman County could next year, no doubt, get in on the "million bushel list." Here's hoping.

Muldrow News — John McDaniel, Kyle Mann and A. Lister each have their large frame barns nearly completed. — The 10-inch snow storm last week put the roads in bad shape for hauling grain, but nevertheless people kept right on hauling, some of them with two teams to the load.

Brewster News — If Brewster had electric lights, sidewalks and water works now, every thing would be complete, and we would have a model town. — Amel Sunday has begun work on his new blacksmith shop. — E.W. Albright has begun the foundation for the church, and Mr. Sweet will do the carpenter work. The main part of the church will be 24x40 and the lecture room 16x20.

November 10, 1905: The Kellogg livery barn is now rigged with a hay fork and an overhead traveling track and crane.

November 11, 1905: A new billiard hall is being erected just north of the Coffin laundry.
