Flu season approaching, county health has shots

With flu season approaching, health officials say October and November is the best time to get a flu shot.

The Sherman County Health Department is having a walk-in flu shot clinic Monday and today from 8:30 to 4:30 p.m. People do not need appointments, said Dorendo Harrel, health department manager. They are covered by Medicare and Medicaid. The cost is \$18 otherwise.

The department got 500 doses in the mail on Friday, Harrel said. If there are shots left over after the clinic, people can make an appoint- department at 890-4888.

ment to get one.

The vaccine's effectiveness depends on the age and the health of the person receiving the shot, officials say. It also depends on how close the match of the vaccine is to the flu going around. If a person is allergic to eggs, though, they should not get a flu shot.

Flu shots use a killed virus. The nasal mist is a live attenuated influenza vaccine not recommended for the elderly, the chronically ill or verv young
