

## Graduate plays on Dodge squad

The Lady Conquistadors of Dodge City Community College opened their basketball season with a pair of victories this week-end at the Pepsi Classic in Liberal.

The Conquistadors beat Howard College of Texas 71-52 on Friday, then came back the next day to defeat Jefferson College of Missouri 66-61.

Seward County Community College, the tournament host, also won both of its games, defeating Jefferson on Friday 94-62 and Howard on Saturday 94-45.

Former Goodland Cowgirl Jessica Osborn is playing in her first basketball season for the Lady Conqs. Last year, she

played on Dodge City's golf team. Osborn, a 2004 graduate of Goodland High, earned honorable mention on the Northwest

Kansas All-League basketball team her senior year.

Also joining the team this season is freshman Ariel Dunker of Atwood, a 2005 graduate of Rawlins County High, who made the all-league team her junior and senior seasons.

The Lady Conqs will be the hosts for the Dodge City Tip-Off Classic starting Friday.

Dodge City was picked to finish sixth in the West Division of the Kansas Jayhawk Community College Conference in the coaches' preseason poll.

# Fort Hays State loses final game

The Fort Hays State University football team played its final game as a member of the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference on Saturday, losing to Western State College of Colorado 26-14 in Hays.

It was the fifth straight loss for the Tigers, who ended their season 2-8 overall and 2-6 in the conference. Next year, the school joins the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association, putting all four NCAA Division II schools in Kansas in the same conference.

The Lopers of the University of Nebraska at Kearney ended the regular season on top of the Rocky

Mountain standings with a 7-1 record after defeating Mesa State College (Colo.) on Saturday 24-14. The Lopers are now 9-2 overall and will face Pittsburg State University in the first round of the playoffs Saturday.

The Orediggers of the Colorado School of Mines salvaged a winning season Saturday with a 42-27 win over Adams State College (Colo.). Both teams finished 6-5 overall.

The Skyhawks of Fort Lewis College (Colo.) ended their year with a 38-31 home win over the Cowboys of New Mexico High-

lands University.

It was not a good weekend for Kansas in Division II football action, as three of its four teams lost including both members of the American Football Coaches Association top 25.

The Ichabods of No. 5 Washburn University fell to unranked Missouri Western State University 28-21 for just their second loss of the season. The Gorillas of Pittsburg State, ranked No. 11, lost big to Central Missouri State University 83-21. Washburn is now 9-2 and Pittsburg State is 8-3.

Despite their losses, both teams

advanced to the playoffs, with Washburn earning a first-round bye. The Ichabods will play the winner of Saturday's first-round game between Angelo State University (Texas) and Northwest Missouri State University.

Colby native Damien Stephens, a senior linebacker for Pittsburg State, has seen action in nine games this season for the Gorillas, recording six tackles.

The Hornets of Emporia State University kept Kansas from being shut out Saturday with a 22-21 win over Misssouiri Southern State University.

# Tabor remains undefeated for season

The Bluejays of Tabor College remained perfect for the season Saturday with a 33-22 home win in Hillsboro over Friends University.

The Bluejays, now 9-0, are ranked No. 6 in this week's poll by the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics, one of only four undefeated teams left in the poll.

Tabor will finish its regular season on Saturday with a home game against the University of St. Mary.

The Coyotes of Kansas Wesleyan

University in Salina saw their play-off hopes dimmed Saturday by a 18-10 loss to the visiting Warriors of Sterling College.

The loss dropped the Coyotes down five spots in the poll to No. 23, after they fell to 7-2 for the season. Kansas Wesleyan travels to Lindsborg on Saturday to face Bethany College.

Freshman defensive back Nolan Cox, a 2005 graduate of Weskan High, made three tackles for Sterling in the game and broke up two

Coyote pass plays.

In other games around the Kansas Collegiate Conference Saturday, Ottawa University defeated Southwestern College 38-35, St. Mary shut out McPherson College 18-0 and Bethel College beat Bethany 49-21.

Saturday marks the end of the regular season for the conference. Other games include Sterling at Friends, Southwestern at McPherson and Ottawa at Bethel.

MidAmerica Nazarene Univer-

sity of Olathe is another ranked team from Kansas at No. 9.

The Pioneers, members of the Heart of America Athletic Conference, improved to 7-2 Saturday after defeating Benedictine College 34-14.

The first round of the playoffs will be Saturday, Nov. 19.

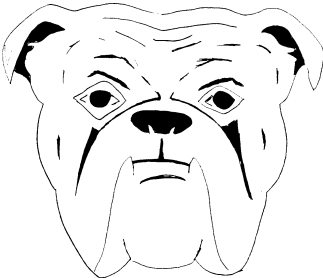
The defending national champion is Carroll College (Mont.), which is 9-0 for the season and has been the top-ranked team since the preseason poll.

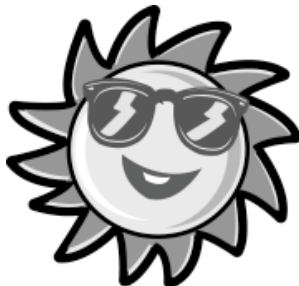

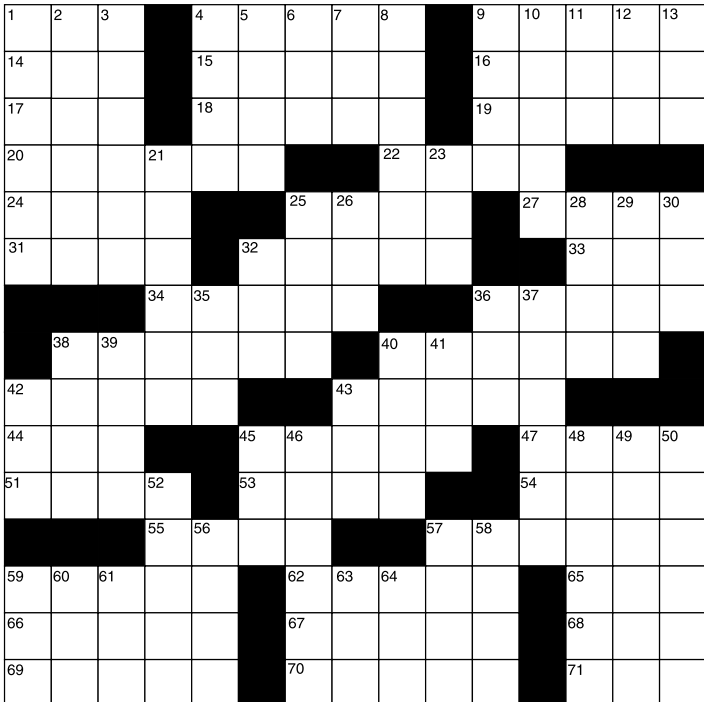
