November 17, 1905: Bloody Row At Resort — Grace Sterling Uses Gun On F.L. Coffin — As a result of a drunken fight at Grace trated on the floor, starting in its Sterling's resort Wednesday night, in which several parties took a hand, Frank L. Coffin, commonly called 'Pete,' is lying at the Coffin place, in the south part of town, in a serious condition.

He is suffering from a bullet wound in one side, inflicted by Grace Sterling, and from a severe kick in the other side, administrated by one of the men engaged in the

Frank Coffin says the trouble started about 10 o'clock in the evening, but it would seem from other evidences that it was at a much later hour. At about midnight or later, Grace Sterling, the keeper of the resort, ran to the office of Dr. Carmichael summoning him to come to her place to give medical aid to the injured.

She was in negligee attire and very much excited and ran back as ety. Since the paper was published fast as she came. Dr. Carmichael hurried to the scene of the trouble, assigned a date.

Dr. Gulick said to a reporter that he was as yet unable to locate the position of the bullet in Coffin's body. He said the bullet took effect when Coffin was apparently proscourse in the right side below the hip and ranging upward into the body. At present, the doctor said, Coffin is suffering most from the severe kick in his left side, and from the shock of the wound.

Some time after the fight, Sheriff Bradley was notified, and he went to the resort and arrested all the occupants, Grace Sterling, and two others, inmates, Fred Prewitt and Andrew Frydendall, and put them

At this writing, they are confined in the county prison, and an investigation before court will be held either today or tomorrow. The cause of the trouble is not yet known, but it is thought that booze was the beginning of the disgraceful affair.
