Town salutes those who served, died for country

War produces veterans who know what it costs to be an American, a Korean War soldier told the crowd at Goodland's Veterans Day service on Friday morning.

More than 100 people attended the service at the Veterans of Foreign Wars hall, held each year at 11 a.m. on Nov. 11 in memory of those who serve and have died for the country since the end of World War I.

Bill Bennett, a retired teacher and Korean veteran from Colby, asked in his full gear and helmet. the veterans in the audience to stand

served in. There were no World War I veterans, as there is believed to be only one left in the entire state.

When Bennett asked for those from World War II, about 20 veterans stood. There were 10 for Korea, six for Vietnam and two from the Gulf War and Iraq.

"We always have sadness when we come back from war," he said. "I remember the funeral in May for Derrick Lutters, and was struck by the smile he had in the photo of him today.

"War produced veterans, and we

and be recognized by the war they will have casualties. The drums of war have beaten for a long, long time.

"We have to continue to care about preserving the U.S. or it will diminish."

Bennett talked about the first American soldier, George Washington, and how he became "the indispensable man" as he was called by the Continental Congress to recruit, train and lead the American army. Through their sacrifices, he said, they gave birth to the nation we have

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City may consolidate recreation programs

Details have to be worked out, but the Goodland City Commission has given the city manager approval to work with the Goodland Activity Center to consolidate recreation programs.

Rich Simon, superintendent of public works, told the commission the idea of consolidating the recreation program surfaced after Jason Hickson resigned as city-county recreation director, saying he planned to move to WaKeeney in December. Simon said he and City Manager

Wayne Hill had discussed the idea and decided to approach the activity center board.

Steve Jimenez, director of the center, told the commissioners last

the adult recreation programs being done by city-county recreation.

"I think the timing is right," Jimenez said. "There are a lot of details to be worked out.

"Our specialty is running programs. We run a number of programs now and have up to 200 kids in one program."

Jimenez said running the programs would be up to the activity center, but maintenance of fields and facilities still would be up to the city.

"We would do the field set up as part of our program," he said. "Running operations, and everything that goes along with that, such as registrations, recruiting teams and dealing with parents, would be the activity center's responsibility....

> Jimenez asked about the vehicles being used by the recreation department. He said the center would like to have use of the pickup that Hickson has been using and a tractor at the ball fields. He said the agency does not have any vehicles. The activity center would buy fuel, Jimenez said, but would ask the city to help maintain the vehicles.

We have insurance to cover activities that are not at our center," he said, "but we would ask the city to help with the increase in insurance costs from increased participation. On staffing, we ask for money to bring those into line with the current recreation position. We need to add

take over running the concessions.

"We are a non-profit organization. All we do goes to our staff, our buildings and to help benefit the kids. This would stabilize us...." Commissioners were receptive.

"This is great if we can get the

details worked out," said Commissioner Annette Fairbanks. "Since Jason has turned in his res-

ignation, it might help the city out with some costs and help the center," said Simon. "Jason is going on to bigger things in WaKeeney. "There is a contract on conces-

sions, and we would have to notify them by Dec. 1, which is 180 days before the contract comes up."

"I think we are duplicating things and feel we can save some money,' said Mayor Rick Billinger.

Simon said he had gone to the

31 to tell them what the proposal is, and had talked to the people on the city-county recreation board.

One of the unanswered questions is what happens to the board. Hill said it is possible the board will have to remain in place because of the property tax levy the county collects for recreation.

"We are not closing," Jimenez said of rumors about problems at the activity center. "Things are tight, but we are doing good, and this would be a good thing for both the city and us. I think we are in a good situation, and are a stable business."

'This is something we should pursue," Commissioner Dave Daniels said. "We need to get something back from Wayne (Hill) about
