Cookbook throws in twist of wit, dose of faith

If you're looking for a book with a twist of wit, a large dose of faith and recipes, "Supper Smoke" by Ruby Seaman fits the bill.

Seaman tells the story of her homesteading parents' faith and courage in North Dakota. She talks of the hardships of the "dirty thirties" and the never-ending patience of her God and of his love. She has included her poetry.

The following recipes are from her book.

Clam chowder

5 medium potatoes cut up small
2 stalks celery, including some chopped leaves
1 onion, chopped
1 carrot, grated
salt and pepper
4 potatoes, grated
2 or 3 cans minced or chopped clams, undrained
1/4 teaspoon thyme
cream or top milk
2 or 3 slices cooked, crumbled bacon
2 or 3 tablespoons butter

In your soup pot put 5 cut-up potatoes, celery, onion and carrot. Add water to cover and begin cooking. Add salt and pepper to taste. While the soup mix is beginning to cook, add the grated potatoes, clams and thyme. Continue cooking until the cut-up potatoes are done. Add cream, bacon and butter. Simmer but do not boil.

Baked eggs

1/4 cup margarine
1/4 cup flour
1/8 teaspoon pepper
1 teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon prepared mustard
2 cups milk
1 1/3 cups grated cheese
8 eggs
6 to 8 slices bacon, cooked and crumbled

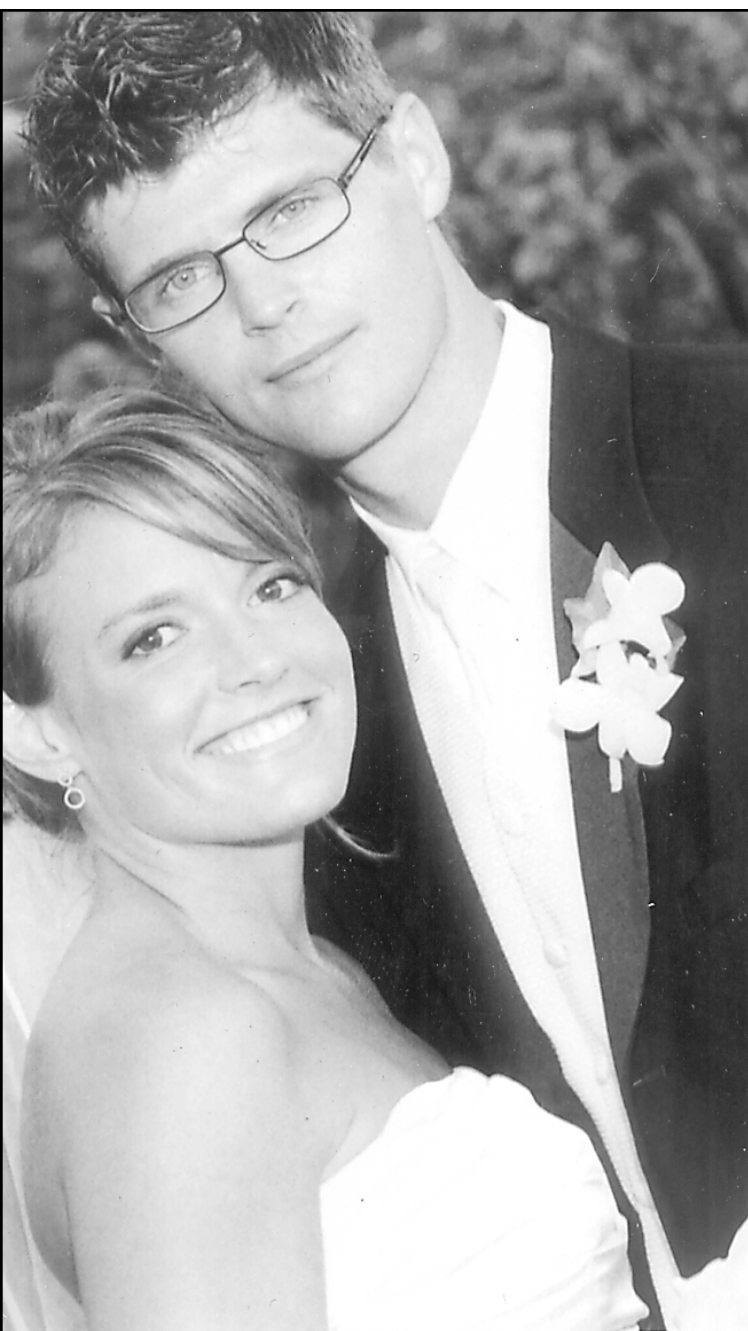
Melt margarine in a medium pan. Add flour and seasonings and bring to a bubble. Remove from heat and slowly add milk. Return to the heat and bring to a boil and stir until thickened. Add cheese and continue stirring until cheese is melted. Grease 4 individual baking dishes or 8 x 8 inch pan. Pour half of the white sauce into the pan. Carefully break eggs into sauce. Pour remaining sauce over the top. Sprinkle with crumbled bacon. Bake at 325 degrees for 20 minutes.

Rose petal jelly

petals from 5 or 6 red fragrant roses (It is best to gather the petals in early morning when roses and their fragrance are best. Be sure to use flowers that have not been sprayed with bug spray.

1 1/2 cups apple juice
1/4 cup lemon juice
1/4 cup water
1 package of pectin

Sense, Trigonometry, Algebraic Manipulations, Informal Geometry and Measurement, Applications of Algebra and Calculations with Calculators.

All events are open to ninth through 12th graders, Elliott said, except Trigonometry, which is only open to 11th and 12th grade students.

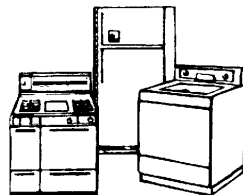
