Sheeder, register of deeds, conveying a part of the estate of C.P. Dewey to B. Walker Peterson.

The part of the estate which is to be transferred is located in Riley, Thomas, Sherman, Cheyenne, Rawlins and Decatur counties. The deed is said to have been made by Gertrude Dewey, the widow of C.P. Dewey. The date of the deed is September 27, 1905.

Mr. Brackett says that if he could get the necessary help at once, he could put up the chute in about six weeks, but since carpenters and laborers are hard to get, owing to the pressing demand from many sides, he thinks it will be three months before the job will be completed.

Readers will remember that in October the Rock Island coal chute in Goodland was in flames, and trestle work in the Rock Island yards was consumed when sparks from a locomotive caused a fire which also destroyed a derrick car.

When the fire was discovered, the shop's whistle sounded the alarm, but the fire had such a good start that it was controlled with difficulty. The shop force piled two streams on the flames and prevented, by vigorous

The southeasterly wind was only a moderate breeze, yet the coal entirely consumed. The fire was supposed to have been caused from the sparks or cinders from a passing engine, setting fire to rubbish which had lodged under the trestle work. This, with coal dust, soon made a

threatening blaze. The breeze carried the blaze away from the coal bins, which made it impossible to keep the fire under control and prevent it spreading to substantial parts of the building.

A large force of men worked two days to replace the burned spans. Now the coal chute will be replaced. The Rock Island company maintains an insurance fund, or in other words, insures its own property, and any loss by fire is made good from that fund.

It will entirely eliminate the coal heaver, heretofore bent with chute, trestle and derrick car were onerous toll; it will do away with the use of locomotives in pushing cars high upon the trestle work; and the pockets, 20 in number, will be filled by the operation of a gate in the main part of the chute.

The coal cars have automatic dumps, will be pulled up the incline by a wire cable, operated by means of a fifteen ton hoist and 25-horsepower Fairbanks Morse gasoline engine, the main part of the chute, so that the coal, instead of being handled by men, will be handled by the invisible force of gravity. The new structure will be 40 feet in height and will hold 600 tons of coal.
