The Goodland Star-News City employees could receive a ation. merit raise of up to 5 percent under a pay plan approved at last Monday's City Commission meeting.

City Manager Wayne Hill proposed a change in the employee pay plan to allow more flexibility, including merit raises to 5 or 6 percent for employees who have reached the maximum under the present plan

"I looked at last year's resolution," Hill said. "The city has three levels, entry, probation and maximum. We have six who are maxed out on this plan.
