"I thought we wrestled very well," said Coach Randy Bahe. "Every kid showed improvement over their performance at the tournament in St. Francis. I was real pleased with their performance."

Sophomore A.J. Stephens brought home the gold at 135 pounds winning all three of his matches, the first two by fall and the title match by an 11-2 major decision. Stephens was voted the outstanding wrestler of the tournament by the coaches.

Also going undefeated and winning the gold were junior Brett Schields at 152 pounds, junior Jon Cook at 160 pounds and senior Chris Baumfalk at 171.
