Sunny holiday forecast

The .03 of an inch of moisture and one inch of snow that fell during flurries Saturday and Sunday may be the closest Goodland will get to a white Christmas this year.

The forecast from the National Weather Service office here for the week is partly cloudy and warmer through Christmas Day on Sunday, with temperatures reaching the mid 50s by the weekend.

Jerry Killingsworth, a forecaster at the Goodland weather office, said the historical average for having snow on the ground on Christmas is just 22 percent. He said in the 92 years of records, Goodland has had snow on Christmas Day nine times, and there was an inch or more of snow on the ground 20 times.

He said last year was technically a white Christmas because it snowed an inch the day before.

The forecast for this year is for above-normal temperatures with below-normal precipitation.

Record snow on the ground on Christmas morning was in 1941, Killingsworth said, when a 13-inch snow storm hit the area. That storm brought about 4 inches on Christmas Day, and the two-week period from Dec. 22, 1941, to Jan. 7, 1942, was cold and snowy, with the overnight temperatures falling below zero.

In 1982, there was 10 inches of snow on the ground Christmas morning. Christmas 1997 had 5 inches on the ground and there was 2 inches on the ground in 1998. The 1 inch of snow last year tied with similar
