Sherman County Historical Society December 23, 1905: Opera House Brings \$1,030 — The opera house was built by W.P.K. Hedrick during the early history of the town, and when the smash came and property values dropped out of sight, the city bought the building from C.F. Weber for \$300 to save it from being torn down.
