The Goodland Star-News An "awesome turnout" jammed Central Elementary School for a fund-raising soup supper Monday night, Principal Sharon Gregory said as she arrived late for a school board meeting.

"We cleared \$1,600," said Gregory.

The cooks used 80 pounds of hamburger for the chili and 20 pounds of chicken for the chickennoodle soup, she said. At one point, the line to get in went down the hall to the library.

The school's site council put on the feed to raise money for the school, Gregory said.

Later, the board gave warehouse supervisor Regina Mastin a plaque for her 24 years with the district. She is retiring.

"I've enjoyed my years here and I have a lot of memories," Mastin said.

The district will get a large share of its money after Feb. 1, said Superintendent Marvin Selby, and two programs were short of money. The board transferred \$25,000 from the general fund to the bilingual fund and \$75,000 to the at-risk fund, with

### Goodland woman back at work after collecting \$120,000 prize

The Goodland Star-News Buying a \$1 Quick Pick lottery ticket has been a Goodland couple's habit for more than a year, and Monday it paid off when they matched all the numbers for the \$120,000 top prize.

"I read it over about 10 times before I called for my husband, Robert, to make sure I wasn't reading it wrong," said Sandy Cotten, 47, head cook at the Goodland Senior Center on Thursday morning as she was getting the carryout meals ready.

She said the couple has been buying tickets for the Super Kansas Cash drawing for over a year. At first, she said, they were trying to use their own favorite numbers

"We weren't getting close with our numbers," she said, "so we decided to go with the Quick Pick, and it paid off this time.

"It shows that even people in the rural area can win a big prize."

Not wanting to let the winning ticket out of her sight, Cotten said, she slept with it Monday. Tuesday, the Cottens were able to check the ticket at a retailer and confirm it was the jackpot winner. They claimed the prize Wednesday at the Kansas Lottery's Great Bend office.

'Goodland is a small enough town we didn't have to call too many people to tell them the good news," Cotten said. "The news is already all over town, and people are calling me."

Anne Hamilton, an employee at Kabredlo's and The Goodland Star-News, was happy to be the one who sold the winning ticket to Robert on Monday. The convenience store is at the corner of Eighth and Caldwell.

Cotten. back at work Thursday, said she was going to keep cooking.

"There is no way I can quit work," she said. "It is a lot of money, but not that much.

She and her husband have three grown children and six grandchildren. Their plans for the prize money, she said, include paying of their debts, and making some investments.

"It's not enough to buy all our kids new houses," she said. "It pays off our bills and lets us live comfortably, which is wonderful."

## Commissioners approve raises

The Goodland Star-News Sherman County commissioners changed chairmen Tuesday, and approved raises for all county employees as part of the first meeting of the new year.

County Clerk Janet Rumpel called the meeting to order at 8 a.m., and asked for nominations for chairman

"I don't want it," said Commissioner Mitch Tiede, who has been the chairman for the past two years.

Commissioner Kevin Rasure said he was interested in being chairman this year. Commissioner Chuck Thomas said if Rasure didn't want the job, he would like to do it.

Tiede nominated Rasure, and the vote was unanimous. Rasure then nominated Thomas to be vice-chairman.

Rasure ask for a motion to designate all banks in Goodland - First National Bank, Bankwest, Western State Bank and People's State Bank - as depositories for county money. The other house keeping motion was to designate The Goodland Star-News as the official newspaper cluded in the salary list, with the for legal publications.

The commissioners went into a closed session for 10 minutes on personnel with Sheriff Kevin Butts and Rumpel. A second closed session for 10 minutes on personnel was held with Rumpel and Deputy Clerk Mary Ann Snethen.

No action was taken after the commissioners returned to open session.

Later in the meeting, the commissioners held two 20-minute closed sessions to discuss the salary list for

the county employees.

A list of raises for the hourly employees had been tentatively approved at the Dec. 30 meeting, but there were a few changes Tuesday.

"We have come to a mutual agreement," said Rasure. "There was some give and take, but we have come up with the salary schedule for this year.

"There are some areas where we made some adjustments that are higher than the cost of living."

Thomas said he would make a motion to approve the list as presented, and Tiede seconded.

Rasure said there are a couple of people who are waiting on their sixmonth review. He said people should remember that the county property tax levy went down about 10 percent this year, saying it is good that the county can give raises and keep the taxes down.

New Treasurer Iris Scheopner and new central dispatch supervisor Crissy Conger are the two officials who will have their salary reviewed after six months.

The commissioners were in-Chairman (Rasure) going to \$15,300 from \$14,450; the vicechair (Thomas) to \$14,300 from \$13,790, and the member (Tiede) to \$13,300 from \$12,730.

County Attorney Bonnie Selby's salary will be \$53,000, up from \$50,631; County Clerk Rumpel will be \$44,000, up from \$41,640 plus \$2,200 as the election official (up from \$2,082) and \$1,213 as the drug and alcohol administrator (up from

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
