He had his family join him in Egypt so he could be sure they were fed. The family was the beginning of the nation of Israel. By the time that is recounted in Exodus, the "nation" of people had grown and had been made slaves to the Egyptians.

God chose Moses to lead the people out of Egypt and then revealed to him the meaning of His name. Exodus 3:13, 14 says, "Nevertheless, Moses said to the true God, 'Suppose I am now come to the sons of Israel and I do say to them, "The God of your forefathers has sent me to you," and they say to me, "What is his name?"
