tions were checked they began looking for the cars.

After the first cell phone call Lt. Kevin Winston of the Kansas Highway Patrol had troopers checking I-70 from the state line to the Sherman-Thomas County line.

The original hope was to trap the suspects within the 20-mile radius of Goodland.

Lt. Winston suggested the suspects might have been further east, but a second alert about another cell phone call through the Goodland tower made the officers double their efforts to locate the car.

Sheriff Butts said he called Crissy Conger at central dispatch and suggested the schools and hospital be notified about the search.

"She told them about the search and left it up to them as to what action they might take," Butts said.

Steve Raymer, activity director at Goodland High School said the school was locked down before the lunch hour and lifted about 2 p.m. The other schools were locked down along with the Goodland Regional Medical Center for a time.

About an hour after the second cell phone call through the Goodland tower there was a third cell phone call, but this time it was on the Colby tower.

At that point Chief Smee felt the search had moved out of Sherman County and recalled his officers. Sheriff Butts had deputies go to the Sherman-Thomas County line and be alert in case the car turned back.

Alerts had been passed along I-70 to be on the lookout for the car, and about 1:30 p.m. a trooper tried to

swered gave the officer information that did not seem to match what they knew.

"The detectives decided to go to Denver and investigate, and asked the Denver police to check out the house."

Jaroscak said the Denver detectives went to the address, but were unable to get anyone to come to the door.

He said the Salt Lake City detectives called the cell phone again, and this time the woman told them things they knew were false because the detectives had a court order allowing them to trace the cell phone

The detectives went to the house, but no one was there. He said they asked neighbors who told them about the man she was with, and they called back to Salt Lake City for a warrant.

"The detectives were about to give up and head back to Utah," Jaroscak said, "when they got the hit on the cell phone again near Goodland, and called Kansas authorities."

Tracking the cell phone calls the Salt Lake City detectives fed the information to Kansas, and the alert was put out to be on the lookout for either the maroon Subaru Legacy or a white Honda Prelude. The Honda was registered to the mother of the man

Jaroscak said when the detectives heard that the car had been stopped at Hays, and the two people were killed, they drove from Denver to Hays.

"We will have to wait until Kansas is done," he said, "but then we will try to find evidence that ties back to the murder in Holladay, Utah. At this time we do not know if we have the people who killed the man and stole the Subaru."

He said the maroon Subaru has not been located, and there is nothing specific to tie the two people killed in the shootout at Hays with the murder and theft.

"It will be slower now," he said, "because we will have to find something to connect the two other than the cell phone.

"I talked to the murdered man's family, and they are happy the sheriff's office is trying to find the killer and the missing car."

Poulos was found shot in the back in the basement of his home on Jan. 14.

He was among the Allied troops that stormed the beaches of Normandy on D-Day, June 6, 1944. He narrowly escaped death that day when he was shot by a German machine-gunner his family said.

The family and friends were offering a \$25,000 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of his killer.

City begins negotiations with Sunflower for power supply

Goodland will find out how much the city will have to pay for power power supply contract for the new next year next week, the City Commission learned last Monday.

Commissioner Dave Daniels had asked City Manager Wayne Hill for an update on rate negotiations with Sunflower Electric Power Corp.

"We will know on Wednesday," Hill replied.

"Have we negotiated with other cities in the area to get a group power rate?" Daniels asked.

"Not that I know of," said Rod Blake, power plant superintendent. Mayor Billinger said if there ever had been an attempt, it was years ago.

Hill said he would keep the commission posted on the negotiations. He said the city is working with \mathbf{N} three contracts, including the one with Sunflower, the wind farm contract with ReNewable Energy Resources and the one with Goodland Energy Resources for power from the proposed coal-fired plant to be built west of town. "We will be talking to Bob Johnson from Sunflower," Hill said, "and have invited Ron Pickman (of Goodland Energy) to be there to talk about their project and how they may be able to fit in. "Pickman has said the Goodland Energy Resources would be willing to re negotiate their agreement to give the city an option to ensure a stable power supply."

The city agreed to an exclusive plant, but the project has been delayed and won't be on line until June 2007. That means the city will have to deal with Sunflower again this year, despite steep hikes expected in the cost. The city has been paying \$53 per megawatt for power from the cooperative's Holcomb plant, but that is expected to jump this year. Blake said having the option would be important if the city assist with the operation of the Airwanted to get its allocation back from the Western Area Power Administration for hydroelectric Goodland, Kansas.
