Section 5. That William H. Frazier ... agrees that the rate charged any customer in the city of Goodland for incandescent lighting, shall not exceed twenty-five county poor farm - \$79.56; J.B. (25) cents per kilowatt hour, and for power, shall not exceed twelve (12) cents per kilowatt hour, and for arc lighting shall not exceed sixteen (16) cents per kilowatt hour. And the minimum charge made against each customer shall not be less that one dollar and fifty cents (1.50) per month.
