Laws protect consumers from debt collection firms

Dear Attorney General Kline: I was very generous in buying Christmas gifts for family and friends and have fallen behind on several bills. I understand that this is my fault, but I am already being hounded by debt collectors. What rules must these agencies follow?

Dear Kansas Consumer:

Any of us can fall behind on payments, especially in the first of the year. In most instances this results only in late fees and high interest rates. But if one gets behind far enough, the result can be debt collection calls. If those calls come from a debt collection firm, then you enjoy certain protections under the Fair Debt Collection Practices

in person, by mail, telephone, telegram or fax. But collectors may not contact you at inconvenient times or to take some specific action.

You can stop a debt collector from contacting you by writing a letter to the collector telling them to stop. After the collector receives your letter, they may not contact if, within 30 days after you receive Debt collectors may contact you you again except to say there will be the written notice, you send the colno further contact or to notify you that the collector or creditor intends



Within a short period of time after you are first contacted, the debt collector must send you a written notice telling you the amount of money you owe, the name of the creditor to whom you owe the money and what action to take if you believe you do not owe the money.

There are also specific debt collection practices which are prohibited:

• Harassment — Debt collectors may not harass, oppress or abuse you or any third parties they contact by using threats of violence or harm, by using obscene or profane language or repeatedly using the telephone to annoy someone.

 False statements — Debt collectors may not use any false or misleading statements when collecting a debt. For example, they may not falsely represent that they operate or work for a credit bureau or falsely imply that you have committed a crime or will be arrested if you do not pay your debt. Debt collectors are also prohibited from giving

• Unfair practices — Debt collectors may not engage in unfair practices when collecting a debt. For example, collectors may not collect any amount greater than your debt or deposit a post-dated check prematurely.
