Two galleries display students' handiwork

Young artists had openings at two galleries in Goodland Monday night, and their work put to shame the stereotype of elementary art, the construction paper and crayon creations that only a parent would love.

Construction paper penguins on watercolor backgrounds, a "village" representing every type of Native American structure imaginable, an aquarium collage and crayon drawings adorn the Carnegie Arts Center.

Elementary representations of Picasso's works from his "Blue Period," cubism and collage, are hanging up in the gym at West Elementary School.

The students' work will be displayed all month for those who missed the opening. The display at the arts center will be up until Tuesday, Feb. 28. The art at West could be up until the school board meeting Monday, Feb. 27, said Secretary Roberta Pianalto, but might be taken down if it is in the way of activities in the gym.

Students at West Elementary had

lessons in Picasso's work from parent volunteers and arts center director Tina Goodwin last week.

Kindergartners worked in collage. First graders did their own renditions of the "Blue Period," and second graders did works in cubism, a style that involves separating the subject into cubes or other geometric forms in abstract arrangement.

Their works are hung in the gym. Pedestals shaped like Corinthian columns, baskets of ivy and poles holding up chain barriers give it the look of an art gallery, and pictures of the students working on their art were projected from a computer to a big screen during the opening.

Works at the center are from students from all three elementary schools, with each student having something in the show.

Visitors entering the gallery were greeted by a display of "Wild Things," creations that combined paint and crayons. There were a few different styles of hearts, including red construction paper with white paint splashes and aluminum foil scrunched up and colored with

bright paint.

Construction-paper snowmen included the flat variety with glittery adornment or accessories glued on, and snowmen of construction paper folded like a fan with hats and gloves glued on.

Students folded and glued construction paper to make apples for their teachers and weaved red construction paper stripes into sheets of white construction paper to make colonial flags.

There were ceiling tiles displayed on the floor. They will be hung on the ceiling at North Elementary after the show is over.

Fall leaves colored with crayons, collages of what a friend is and pictures of Jayhawks, meadowlarks, buffalo, turtles and sunflowers, representing Kansas, are also part of the display.

The Goodland Arts Council hopes the display draws plenty of visitors to kick off the year and help their membership drive, which is going on now. People wanting to join or renew a membership should drop by the arts center.

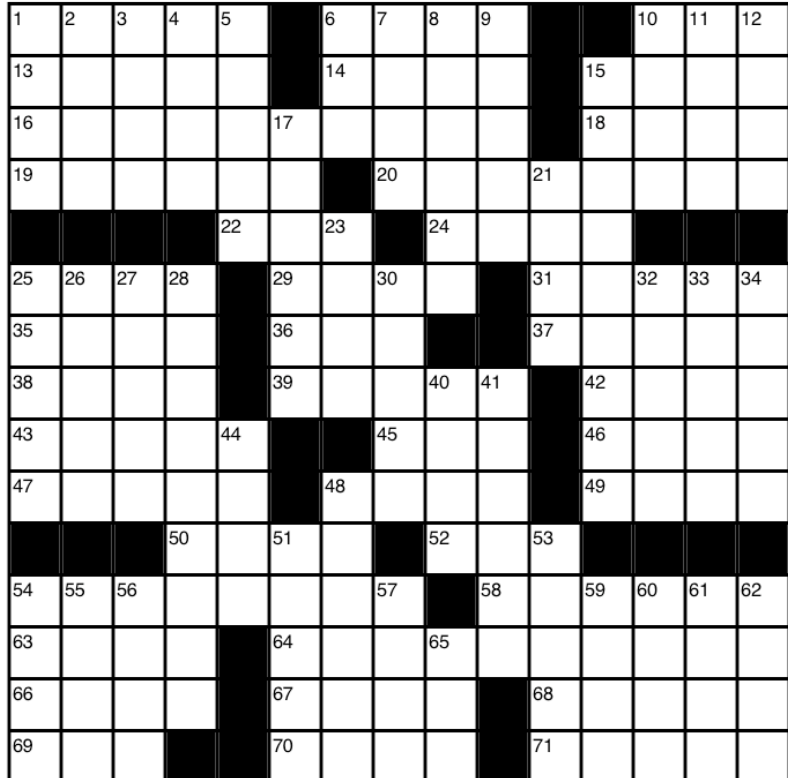
