## Goodland man sentenced to 47 months for sex explotation

District Judge Jack Burr sentenced Sapp's attorney. a Goodland man to 47 months, almost four years, in jail with no probation on Monday in a plea bargain on one count of sexual exploitation of a 16-year-old child and one of lewd and lascivious behavior.

Terry L. Sapp Jr., 38, was sentenced to a 14 months with the Kansas Department of Corrections on Jan. 31 in the Thomas County District Court. The case in Sherman in Thomas County.
