DECA to compete at state conference Saturday–Tuesday



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The Goodland High School DECA I and II chapters have been busy preparing for competition at the organization's state career development conference through their community service projects, including one that encourages shopping in Goodland.

Twenty-six DECA members are scheduled to compete at state in written events (manual and interviews), series competition (test and role play case studies) and state officer competitions. The conference will be Saturday-Tuesday, March 4-7, in an effort to persuade every consumer in Overland Park

To prepare for competition in their Entreprenuership Promotion Project, said sponsor Richard Schwasinger, DECA members in January organized Entrepreneurship Promotion Week, with activities Goodland." to educate club members, Goodland consumers and business people to buy merchandise and service here.

DECA members have operated concession stands to enter their Learn and Earn Project. Sports fans have enjoyed new merchandise offerings at the stands, Schwasinger said, including soft pretzels, chili cheese dogs and chili nachos. These new products have been popular, he said,

DECA members have been promoting and have proved to be a big boost to the profits of the stands.

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The Learn and Earn Project provides DECA members the opportunity to set up a business plan and develop their marketing and management skills, he said.

DECA members also have been raising money for the Northwest Kansas Animal Shelter and are planning a paintball tournament to raise money for the local Red Cross Chapter and the Red Cross National Disaster Relief Fund.

They have sold calendars, Schwasinger said, to raise money for the animal shelter and are trying to raise more money by bringing together groups of 10 people who would donate \$10 each to adopt and care for a pet. Sponsors estimate that it costs \$100 per year to care for a single animal at the shelter, he said.

The paintball tournament is in the final planning stages, Schwasinger said, and members will be distributing signs and pamphlets throughout Goodland, advertising and contacting paintball enthusiasts to promote it.
