Tips offered for getting rid of fruit

A question I get occasionally is, 'How do we eliminate unwanted fruit from our crabapple trees?"

Ward UpHam, Kansas State University horticulturist, provided the following information on fruit removal at a recent program:

He said the reason people want the fruit removed is because it can be both messy and hazardous, and if you ever walked under a late-season crabapple, you know what he is talking about.

Crabapples are the easiest to control, by applying the common insecticide Sevin (carbaryl) soon after the blossoms have dried on the trees.

Do not apply Sevin during bloom because it is extremely toxic to bees. Spray trees thoroughly with 2 tablespoons of Sevin per gallon of water. Check the label on Sevin to make sure this use is present.

Stems on the fruit should turn yellow and wrinkle, and the tiny apples should start to drop in seven to 10 days.
