Sheriff Butts ordered the arrest of Tim Armknecht when he came home and was in the Bastille on Wednesday. Showalter said he expected County Attorney Bonnie Selby to charge the Armknecht's each with 14 counts of animal cruelty. The Armknechts made their first court appearances Thursday afternoon.

Tim Armknecht told Butts the horses were sick and he had no money to feed them.
