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


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












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Patriotism theme for two contests

Two local organizations have contests for students with patriotic themes. The Goodland Elks Lodge has been having an Americanism Essay Contest for nine years. The Veterans of Foreign Wars and its auxiliary have had the Voice Of Democracy program for 59 years.

Michael Smith, sponsored by the Goodland post and its auxiliary, was the third place winner in the Kansas State Voice of Democracy program. Michael Smith is son of Celia Smith and grandson of Margaret Diaz. Smith is currently a junior at Goodland High School. Smith received a \$500 scholarship.

The contest has participants write and record a three-to-five minute script on a patriotic theme. The topic was "How I Demonstrate My Freedom." Over 100,000 students participate in this program nationwide. The first place winner was Ted Hodges of Salina, who received a \$1,000 scholarship and a trip to Washington, D.C. and the Voice of Democracy Youth Conference in Valley Forge, Pennsylvania. The second place winner was Michelle Pomeroy from Newton.

The Elks Americanism Essav Contest theme was "What I Feel When I Look Up at the American Flag?"

The Division I (fifth and sixth graders) first place winner was Chantel Coates, fifth grader from North Elementary whose parents are Rick and Michelle Coates. The only entry in the Division II (seventh and eighth grade) was Cameron Crocker from Colby Middle School in Colby.

Each of winners received a \$50 savings bond and went on to compete at the district level. District winners compete at the state level and the state winners then compete at the national level.

The Elks had 77 essays from Goodland, Weskan, Bird City, McDonald and Colby. The essays were judged by two former teachers, Vicki White and Linda Knott. The essays had to be typed or printed in ink, not be longer than 250 words and written by students in the fifth, sixth, seventh or eighth grades

The Elks Americanism Essay Contest theme was "What I Feel When I Look Up at the American Flag?'
