said. "But that won't stop us from getting everything ready to go. Then we can begin the real work of building the plant."

The plant will primarily burn coal, but the permit allows them to substitute up to 30 percent with sunflower hulls. Pickman said the sunflower hulls can come from the Archer Daniels Midland plant located at Caruso, or from another source.

Once the plant has been assembled and they are ready to fire up the boiler and turbine generator the state will have to be notified. Once the plant is fired up there are a series of tests and requirements that have to be met within 60-90 days to get

the certificate of operation from the state health department.

ing, and that the construction of the energy center should be at full speed by the beginning of summer. Mark Justus, head of ReNewable

Energy Resources, said once the construction begins on the power plant it will take about a year to complete. He said it will take a crew of about

210 to assemble the power plant using three shifts around the clock.

While many of the construction workers will be skilled in specific areas Justus expects about half to come from the surrounding area. He said the boiler workers will be coming from overseas.


