Restoring city treasure

The Goodland Star-News Members of the Goodland Rotary and Lions clubs loaded pieces of the Christmas display usually put up around the hospital Saturday morning and moved them to the old Corner Garage paint shop for repair.

Jeanette Foust, one of the original artists who will be in charge of the restoration, studied the larger pieces lying flat on the floor.

The next step will be evaluation of what work needs to be done and a cost estimate, said Josh Dechant, a member of the Rotary Club. The workers commented on how big some of the pieces were.

"We never had heat to work on the pieces before," she said. "There was no heat in the Centennial Building when we first did them."

The display was finished in 1988 by Foust, Maxine Rauscher and Connie Hatcher, who now lives in Arizona.

Foust said they have the original drawings and the formulas for the colors, since the artists mixed their own col-

'Everyone' sick in January good news for hospital

The Goodland Star-News A lot of people were sick in January, but it wasn't all bad news.

Goodland Regional Medical Center saw a lot of patients, stressing the staff and forcing the hospital to send some elsewhere, but the silver lining showed up in the financial reports.

January was a huge month, Administrator Jay Jolly told the hospital board at its regular meeting Monday, Feb. 27; it seemed like everyone was sick.

The hospital was on "divert" several times, said Debbie Hickman,

director of patient care services, due to the number of patients and due to staff being sick. A nurse who has just worked 12 hours can't work another 12, she said; when the call-in list has been exhausted, patients have to be sent to other hospitals.

The hospital was on divert five times, said Administrative Assistant Dianna Briney, but there may not have actually been any patients sent to other hospitals. The hospital has to go on "divert," she said, when it has either reached its bed limit or has as many patients as the staff can care

Police search for unlucky robber who tried to hold up motel here

The Goodland Star-News An unlucky robber attempted to hold up the Comfort Inn on K-27 about 6:40 a.m. Sunday, but left empty handed.

Officer Greg Kroskey said he got to the motel a few minutes after the robber left, and put out an alert for a full-sized blue van with green tags headed west on I-70.

Police Chief Ray Smee said a state trooper west of Goodland did not see the van.

"He came in twice," Kroskey said. "The first time he asked the clerk, Tammy Randall, for a room and asked where he was. She told him they were full and

showed him where he was on a map.

"He left and came back in and asked for a cup of coffee. She showed him the breakfast area, and when he came back he lifted up his shirt to show her the gun and said 'Give me your money.'

'She told him 'I don't have any, I made the drop already,' and showed him the empty cash drawer.

"He told her, 'Best not call the cops, I didn't done anything,' and left. She watched him drive off and head up the Interstate and called 911."

Smee said the clerk described the man as white, 5 foot, 4 inches tall, weighing 125-150 pounds, with
