will be reported to the state board of health.

Contagious diseases to be reported at once are diphtheria, scarlet fever, smallpox, measles, typhoid fever, cholera infantum, dysentery and pneumonia, and any other diseases dangerous to public

Births are to be reported in 10 days; deaths reported at once. All midwives are expected to comply with these laws and rules.

Goodland is now a city of the second class, in fact as well as in name, and the rapid increase in population will require greater vigilance in regard to sanitary conditions.

All nuisances must be abated at once, alleys cleaned up, stables and sheds cleaned — and kept clean and last but not least, no pigs will be allowed kept inside of city limits after April 30. No further notice will be given.


