Homeowners seeing a few ants can avoid big spring invasion

Homeowners who see a few ants indoors now may be looking at an invasion soon.

As ants be-

come active in

search for food and water. When those scouts find what they're looking for, they lay down a chemical trail to show others the way. If you can trace a line of ants back

to a nest, control can sometimes be achieved quickly. Using a labeled insecticide, treat the nest site and needed. However, ant nests are usually outdoors and sometimes difficult to find.

Treating the indoor part of the ants' trail provides only temporary relief — ants simply find another to try another. route. Finding and caulking all potential entry points isn't practical because of the tiny size of the in-

Control strategies that usually work the best are sanitation and baits. Sanitation includes eliminating crumbs, grease, scraps and other available food sources, which will discourage ants.

Baits are used to work on the nesting site — ants are tricked into taking the insecticide back to their nest. Ant activity may even increase dana belshe

the spring, they send out scouts to around a station as they work on the new-found food source. The insecticides in the baits are meant to be slow-acting, so they can be taken back to the colony before the ant dies. The insecticide can then destroy an entire nest.

Anumber of bait-insecticide formulas in child-resistant "stations" monitor it to see if re-treatment is are available in stores. Unfortunately, not all ants are attracted to the same bait, and ants' food preferences can change. If one bait product doesn't seem to be attracting your invaders, you might need
