City has road work ready to start

City officials told the Sherman County commissioners Tuesday they have two road projects ready to begin in the next 90 days.

City Manager Wayne Hill and City Commissioners Josh Dechant and Annette Fairbanks attended the county meeting Tuesday and said they have given engineer Darin Neufeld permission to proceed with replacement of the intersections at Caldwell and Eighth and Armory Road.

Neufeld, who handles the city's engineering work for Evans, Bierly, Hutchison and Associates, said he has begun design work on the two intersections, which are to be replaced with concrete. He said while they are replacing

the intersections the city hopes to get the engineering on Caldwell ready for asphalt to be put down next County Commissioner Mitch

Wife pushes for Goodland engineer

People are being urged to contact Sherman County commissioners to support giving the engineering contract for county road projects to a firm with an office in Goodland.

The commissioners delayed a decision on selecting an engineering firm for the joint city-county road projects until Penco Engineering of Plainville can make a presentation at 8:30 a.m. on Tuesday.

City Commissioner Josh Dechant, who was at the county meeting, said he felt that Darin Neufeld of Evans, Bierly, Hutchison and Associates, which has an office in Goodland, was the "go-to guy" for the city. He said he felt the firm should be approved to do all the engineering on the joint street and road project.

The county board seemed to be leaning 2-1 toward

Penco, with only Commissioner Kevin Rasure talking for Neufeld, on Tuesday. Public Works Manager Curt Way spoke well of the central-Kansas firm.

Then the Goodland engineer's wife unleashed an e-mail salvo asking dozens of people to call commissioners and back the "local" firm. (While Evan, Bierly has a two-man office here, the firm's main office is in Great Bend.)

The e-mail started flying about 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, and County Commissioner Chuck Thomas said he started getting phone calls early Wednesday

Thomas said he was surprised at the number of calls, and thought the pressure might make a fair decision on the engineering question more difficult. He said there are two sides to the story, and he felt


